

R.E.A.C.H. Program- One of a Kind

- There is a lack of resources available to college students interested in healthcare professions in the Bakersfield area
 - No hospital within 20 miles of the East Niles Community Health Center (ENCHC) provides clinical shadowing for college students
 - UCLA is the closest medical school, over 110 miles away
 - The next closest family medicine residency program is over 85 miles away

R.E.A.C.H. Program-About Us

- The R.E.A.C.H. Program is a pipeline program run by the Clinica Sierra Vista Rio Bravo Family Medicine Residency Program for college students interested in healthcare professions
- The program is 12 weeks long and provides students volunteering, shadowing, and mentoring experiences at the ENCHC
- We currently hold 2-3 sessions a year and take 6-10 students per session

R.E.A.C.H. Program- Overview


- During the 12 weeks students will have variety of experiences at ENCHC
 - A session with the front desk
 - Shadowing the nurses and medical assistants
 - **7** 10 Sessions shadowing resident physicians
 - ↗ ~40 hours of shadowing experience

R.E.A.C.H. Program- Didactics

Didactic Session Topics

- Obesity and BMI calculations
- Diabetes and blood glucose monitoring
- Hypertension and manual blood pressure monitoring
- Sessions are optional, but well received
- Coordinating the student volunteers' schedules has been the most challenging obstacle for these sessions

オ Strengths

- Started in June 2016, and has been ongoing since
- Out of 48 participants so far, 27 are members of underrepresented minorities (56%)
- California State University Bakersfield (CSUB) and Bakersfield College are predominantly commuter schools, so most of our participants are from Kern County, a vastly underserved area
- Students spend their time at the ENCHC, part of the Clinica Sierra Vista network of FQHC's, with a organizational HPSA score of 19

Weaknesses

- Although we have tried to make the program selfsustaining, recent enrollment has dropped off
- This decline started about a year ago, when the medical student who initially launched our program tried to hand over its operations to residency staff
- Needs a "champion" within the program to maintain momentum

- Opportunities
 - Just reorganized our medical student rotations, with a new faculty member as Director of Student Clerkships, and a dedicated administrative assistant
 - Have placed the REACH program under their list of responsibilities creating our "Champion"
 - Have organized a committee to evaluate the program, looking at ways to strengthen and improve it
 - One of our PGY 2 residents is a graduate of CSUB, (on the above committee), and has agreed to assist us in networking with clubs and service groups at the college
 - Currently planning a lecture on "How to apply to medical school"
 - Contemplating an expansion to include select high school students

Threats

- Many of our students come from disadvantaged backgrounds, and therefore must work as well as attend school
 - can make scheduling difficult
- Bakersfield College is 6.5 miles and CSUB 14 miles away from our clinic
- By public transportation, CSUB is an hour and a half away, Bakersfield College 40 minutes
- May need to consider transportation assistance to allow some students the opportunity to participate

Rio Bravo & Song Brown

- The Rio Bravo Family Medicine Program would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Song Brown Commission for their years of support
- We received our first award in 2014, the year the program was started
- As a Teaching Health Center, our funding has been capped by HRSA at our initial level of 18 residents
- This year with ACGME approval, we have expanded to 24 resident slots, making our Song Brown funding vital to our ongoing success


