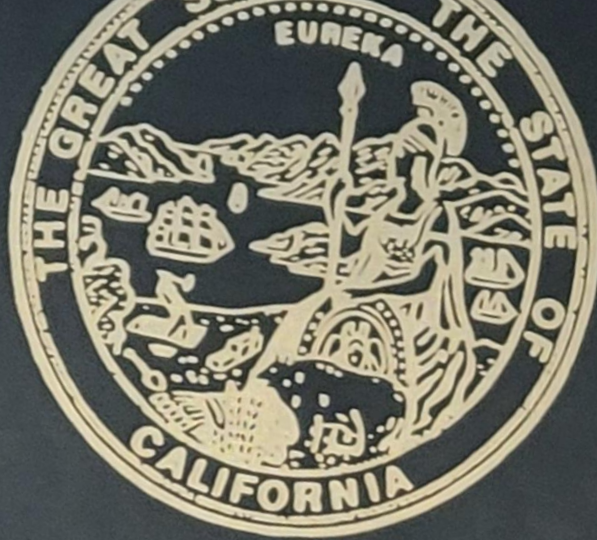

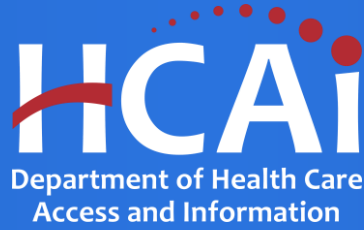

- **Topic 1:** Call to Order and Welcome – Jim Malley, Board Chair
 - Called to order April 9, 2026 at 10:00 a.m.; attendees welcomed.
- **Topic 2:** Roll Call and Meeting Advisories/Expectations – Veronica Yuke, Executive Director
 - Roll call conducted; quorum established.
- **Topic 3:** HCAI Update – Lemeneh Tefera, HCAI Chief Medical Officer & Deputy Director
 - Swore in Michael Foulkes and Scott Karpinen as Director-Appointed Ex-Officio members.
 - Rural Health Transformation Program (HR1 bill, \$50B/5 yrs): California awarded \$233.6M for Year 1.
 - Three initiatives set (transformative care model, workforce, and technology/tools. First applications will be for Accelerator Partnerships with the RFA expected this spring.

- **Topic 4:** Approval of the December 10–11, 2025, Full Board Meeting Report – Jim Malley, Board Chair
 - Recapped the December meeting: Vice-Chair election of Cody Bartley, swearing-in of Belinda Young, Farzad Naeim's reappointment, and recognition of retiring members Michael O'Connor and Bert Hurlbut.
 - Summarized HCAI program updates and June 2025 minutes approval
 - Committee and subcommittee reports/updates included Collaborative Inspection Approach to Hospital Construction Webinar Development Subcommittee, Technology and Research Committee, HCAI Design Guide for Planning and Preparing for Disasters Webinar Development Subcommittee, Codes and Processes Committee, Structural and Nonstructural Regulations Committee, and Instrumentation Committee.
 - 2026 Committee Assignments were discussed.
 - OSHPD year end report and update was presented.
 - Teresa Endres made an excellent presentation on healthcare design trends.
 - 10 motions were approved and three ad hoc subcommittees created.
 - Motion to approve the report: Farzad Naeim / Cody Bartley — passed unanimously.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 5:** Ad Hoc HCAI Design Guide for Planning and Preparing for Disasters Webinar Development Subcommittee – Teresa Endres, Chair
 - Reviewed three subcommittee meetings (Nov 20, 2025; Jan 22 and Mar 11, 2026) on the 2024 design guide; webinars add depth beyond the ASHE PDC rollout.
 - Identified seven webinar topics: Power Independence, two WUI (Title 24, Part 7 and HVAC), three Infection Control (HVAC, Operations and Design), and Hazard Vulnerability Assessment. Likely combined into four webinars.
 - WUI Title 24 Part 7 webinar scheduled for May 14, 2026; OSHPD to deliver a standard introduction for each webinar.
 - Motion to approve the three subcommittee reports: Teresa Endres / Michael Davis — passed unanimously.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 6:** “Collaborative Inspection Approach to Hospital Construction” Webinar Development Subcommittee – Michael Davis, Chair
 - A webinar was delivered January 14, 2026: about 775 registrants, 492 attendees (understated due to group viewing), and 37 questions asked.
 - 39% of attendees completed the survey and 82% of respondents scored the webinar between 8 and 10 — strong feedback.
 - Feedback reinforced owner engagement across all phases and collaboration at every level; consistent messaging from all shareholders regarding the need for collaboration was an important theme throughout the webinar; the “OAC” concept was reframed as “OACI” to include the inspector.
 - Chris Tokas discussed plans to expand the material into a one-day seminar, then a written guide.
 - Informational item — no motion.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 7:** Ad Hoc Educational Opportunities to Advance Structural Health Monitoring by Hospitals
Subcommittee – Martin Hudson, Chair
 - Met January 29 and March 26, 2026, building on the 2023 white paper on seismic instrumentation; modern sensors (MEMS) are now phone-sized can be installed economically.
 - Four deliverables are planned by the committee to move this effort forward: two-page public summary (Hudson), webinar series outline (Courtney Johnson), how-to implementation guide (Jim Malley), and a possible addendum to the 2023 white paper.
 - Evan Reis of Safehub presented March 26 on how MEMS are implemented; CGS has begun producing informational videos to spur interest; Janice Cheung volunteered to serve as accessibility reviewer.
 - Motion to approve the January 29 report: Martin Hudson / Teresa Endres — passed unanimously.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 8:** Ad Hoc How-To-Guide Development for Preapproved Fabricated Components and Systems Subcommittee – Cody Bartley, Chair
 - The committee met February 12 and March 19, 2026 (Overview only), building on a 2024 webinar; the deliverable was clarified from a white paper into an advisory guide.
 - Vendors Durafuse, SurePods, and Starc presented on March 19; two are on version three of their Preapproved Component System (PCS) and cited more project opportunities.
 - Goal: assemble content and release the advisory guide by year end; next meeting set for May.
 - Motion to approve the February 12 report: Cody Bartley / Carl Newth — passed unanimously.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 9:** Instrumentation Committee – Martin Hudson, Committee Chair
 - Met March 24, 2026 (overview only; minutes not yet in the package). Safehub presented again and CSMIP updated the committee on hospital instrumentation.
 - Chris Tokas emphasized “building health monitoring” over “structural health monitoring,” focusing on user value and nonstructural components, systems, and equipment.
 - Farzad Naeim highlighted the CalOES MyShake project (10,000+ subscribers) using cell-phone data for basic building health monitoring.
 - Long-term goal: Develop green/yellow/red-light status indicators to prevent unnecessary hospital evacuations after earthquakes.
 - No motion.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 10:** Education and Outreach Committee – Teresa Endres, Committee Chair
 - Met March 4, 2026. Received updates on all four subcommittees: Collaborative Inspection Approach to Hospital Construction Webinar Development, Ad Hoc HCAI Design Guide for Planning and Preparing for Disasters Webinar Development, Ad Hoc Educational Opportunities to Advance Structural Health Monitoring by Hospitals, and Ad Hoc How-To-Guide Development for Preapproved Fabricated Components and Systems.
 - Discussed a potential webinar on the Functional Program Advisory Guide (published September 2025); champions are Eric Jacobson, Clara Wu, and Teresa Endres.
 - The webinar is pending OSHPD's reissuance of the guide with compliance diagrams not initially provided by AIA.
 - Motion to approve the March 4 report: Teresa Endres / Kelly Martinez — passed unanimously.

- **Topic 11:** Appoint a Nominating Committee for Chair and Vice-Chair Elections – Jim Malley, Board Chair
 - Every two years the Chair appoints a Nominating Committee; the election is held at the August meeting and elected officers are sworn in December.
 - Jim Malley appointed Michael Foulkes and Scott Karpinen to the Nominating Committee for the August 2026 elections.
 - Members interested in serving as Chair or Vice-Chair should contact Veronica Yuke, Michael Foulkes, or Scott Karpinen to be interviewed before August.
 - The committee will present a slate, accept floor nominations, and conduct the election. No motion (appointment item).

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 12:** Office of Statewide Hospital Planning and Development (OSHDPD) Update – Chris Tokas, Deputy Director (Part 1)
 - Chris Tokas, Arash Altoontash, and Richard Tannahill framed the update around human-centered design — shifting from authority to collaboration and compliance to performance.
 - Modernization: eTIO starting pilot testing (seeking small-project volunteers); eSP fully cloud-based, completed late 2025; biweekly meetings with CDPH for program-flex coordination.
 - Plan review: \$24.64B total activity (\$13.2B construction, \$8.5B plan review); 56–60% of reviews completed within 10 days (17-day average return). Large surge of submittals prior to 1/1/26 due to code change and 3/1/26 for seismic compliance reports.
 - Major completions: City of Hope Orange County, Irvine Medical Center (all-electric), Riverside, a UHS tower, Scripps Encinitas (first half), and Hoag Irvine east pavilion.

OVERVIEW OF TOPICS

- **Topic 12: OSHPD Update – Chris Tokas, Deputy Director (Cont.)**
 - Code updates: equipment seismic-labeling memo (permanent labels per Chapter 17 / ASCE 7); OSHPD opposed higher risk-category reclassification of skilled-nursing and behavioral-health facilities.
 - AB 130 froze building-code changes after the June wildfires, blocking healthcare-beneficial updates; CAN-110 revised so plans must be accepted for review (not just submitted) to lock the code cycle.
 - Seismic compliance: 343 facilities (88%) submitted plans; ~80% of buildings now conforming; 42 AB 869 extension applicants; AB 1882 signage 55% compliant of 2,656 buildings. NPC 70% plan to continue retrofitting and 30% plan to remove the buildings from acute care services.
 - Small & Rural Hospitals Grant Program: \$11.3M awarded, ~\$50M available. Workforce: 40 new IORs and 89 recertified;
 - Eric Jacobson now leads BSU after Mia Marvelli's retirement.

- **Topic 13:** Comments from the Public/Board Members on Non-Agenda Items – Jim Malley, Board Chair
 - Glenn Gall (member of the public) noted that the statute disallowing major rulemaking during interim code cycles leaves healthcare standards up to eight years behind.
 - He suggested adopting guidelines in full during major cycle adoptions; Chris Tokas agreed but noted current California law constrains OSHPD.
- **Topic 14:** Adjournment – Jim Malley, Board Chair
 - Jim Malley thanked attendees and staff, looked forward to the August meeting in Sacramento, and reminded members to contact leadership about Chair/Vice-Chair interest.
 - The meeting was adjourned at 3:41 p.m.

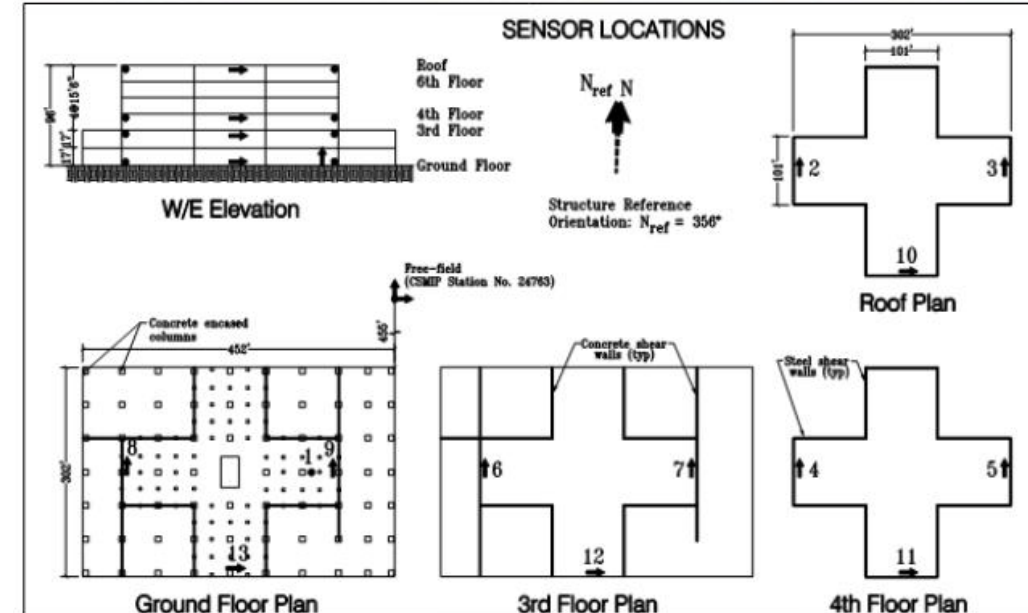


Figure 7. Photo (top) and sensor lay out diagram (bottom) of the six-story Olive View-UCLA Medical Center (New Sylmar County Hospital). Arrows in the schematic diagram show the locations and indicate the directional sensitivity of the strong-motion sensors (accelerometers). The sensors are connected to a central data acquisition system in the building.⁶

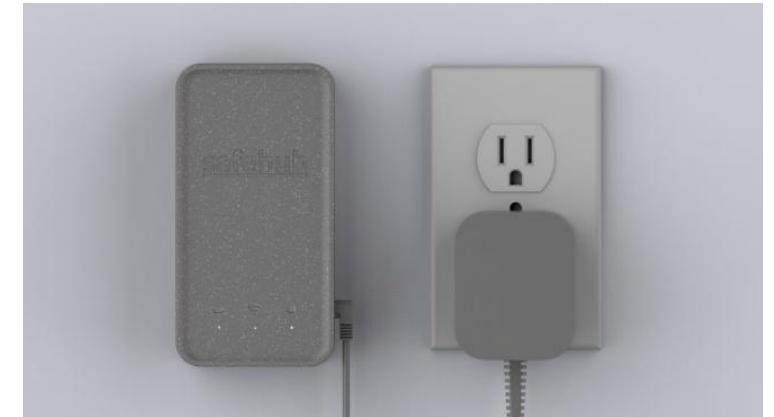

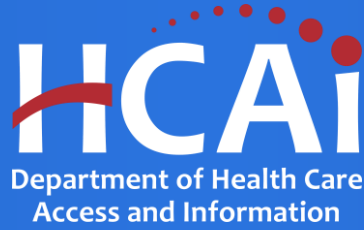

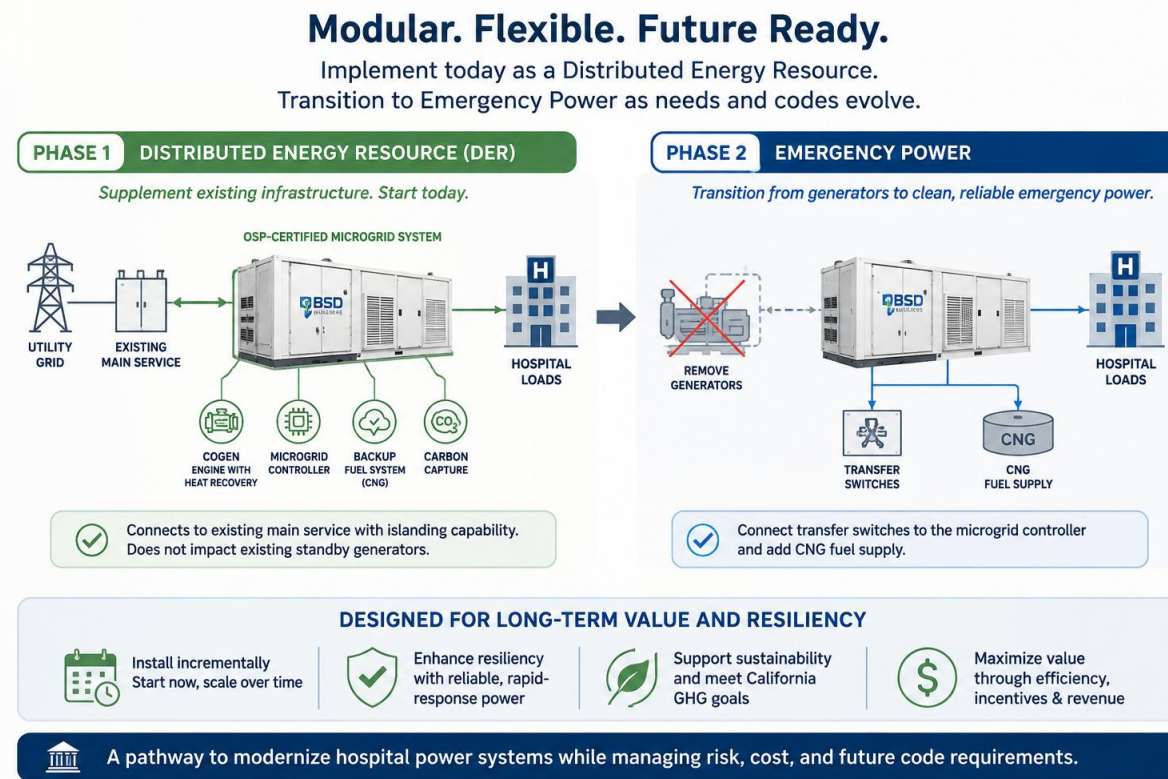
Topic 1 – Affordable Clean Energy for Supplemental and Emergency Back-Up Power

Presenter: Jeff Blair, President, BSD Builders, Inc.; Patrick Castro, Executive Vice President BSD Builders, Inc.; Frank Shadpour, PE, Principal, SC Engineers; and William “Rocky” Tanner, PE, Principal, RTM Engineering Consultants

The Committee received a presentation on a **microgrid solution combining cogeneration, carbon capture, and microgrid controls** as an alternative approach to supplemental—and potentially emergency—hospital power. The system uses OSP-certified reciprocating-engine cogeneration units to produce electricity while recovering waste heat for domestic hot water, heating, cooling, or steam. Presenters reported overall efficiencies approaching **90%**, substantially reduced energy costs, islanding and black-start capability, and the ability to respond rapidly to large block loads—an important consideration for healthcare emergency power systems.

Topic 1 – Affordable Clean Energy for Supplemental and Emergency Back-Up Power

The presentation also highlighted **carbon capture technology** that converts engine exhaust CO₂ into marketable liquid CO₂, potentially helping hospitals meet California greenhouse-gas reduction goals while creating additional financial incentives or revenue. Of particular interest to the Committee was the system's potential to **supplement existing hospital power infrastructure or ultimately replace conventional diesel emergency generators**, using an OSP-certified compressed-natural-gas backup fuel system. The modular, largely exterior installation could also allow hospitals to implement the technology incrementally, initially as a distributed energy resource and later transition it to emergency power as existing generators reach the end of their useful lives.



Topic 1 – Affordable Clean Energy for Supplemental and Emergency Back-Up Power

Committee Discussion & Key Takeaways

Committee discussion focused on the practical application of microgrid technology in healthcare facilities. Presenters indicated systems are typically sized at approximately **125% of peak load**, with reported combined heat-and-power efficiencies approaching **88–91%**. Emergency fuel storage was also discussed: the currently certified CNG tank configuration provides approximately **six hours of operation for an 800-kW unit**, while hospital applications can be configured with additional storage to target **96 hours of on-site fuel**. Space requirements were characterized as manageable but significant; a current approximately 5-MW installation requires roughly **5,000–6,000 square feet**, including equipment, carbon capture, setbacks, and access.

The Committee also explored **OSP certification, commissioning, integration with existing hospital infrastructure, and code compliance**. Presenters noted that older facilities may require upgrades to existing electrical service and that conventional heating or steam systems may still be necessary for redundancy and high-temperature hospital loads. Particular discussion centered on how microgrids used as emergency power sources are addressed under **NFPA 99, NFPA 110, and NEC Article 517**. Recent code changes increasingly recognize distributed energy resources, microgrid controllers, and other **“onsite power sources”** rather than relying exclusively on traditional generators. The discussion highlighted both the potential of this technology and the need for **clear, consistent commissioning, testing, and regulatory pathways as these systems become more common in California hospitals**.

The Committee received a status update and live demonstration of HCAI's new **electronic Testing, Inspection and Observation (eTIO) program**, which has moved from development into active pilot use. The system is currently being used on approximately four projects with two different DPORs, with feedback from design professionals, IORs, and HCAI staff reported as largely positive. The pilot is also helping identify and resolve remaining functionality issues before broader deployment. Development is estimated to be **90–95% complete**, with the goal of making eTIO available for use on any project by the end of the year and ultimately transitioning away from the paper TIO process.

The demonstration highlighted the system's **cloud-based integration with eServices, role-based access for DPORs, IORs and HCAI staff, electronic VCR processing with identity verification, and HCAI milestone sign-off capabilities**. Current development priorities include refining VCR workflows, adding digital signatures and document-locking during HCAI review, and completing remaining functionality identified through the pilot. A significant focus is also being placed on user education, including webinars, short topic-specific instructional videos, and an interactive role-based training environment that allows users to learn the eTIO workflow before working in the live system.

Topic 3 – Reliable Backup Power for Healthcare Facilities: Hybrid SuperCapacitor Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) Units
Presenter: Alan Forster, Musashi Energy Solutions

The Committee received a presentation on **hybrid supercapacitor technology as an alternative to traditional battery energy storage for healthcare UPS systems**. The discussion emphasized the increasingly critical power-quality and continuity requirements of hospitals, where imaging systems, electronic medical records, connected medical devices, and other sensitive equipment cannot tolerate even brief interruptions while emergency power sources transition. Traditional VRLA and lithium-ion batteries provide this bridge but present challenges including limited service life, maintenance, degradation, space requirements, and—in the case of lithium-ion—thermal runaway and associated life-safety and permitting concerns.

Topic 3 – Reliable Backup Power for Healthcare Facilities: Hybrid SuperCapacitor Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) Units

Mr. Forster described hybrid supercapacitors as a **long-life, high-cycle, non-thermal-runaway energy storage solution** particularly suited to the 30–60 second UPS bridging period needed until alternate power is available. The technology offers a projected **20+ year service life**, hundreds of thousands to potentially one million charge/discharge cycles, rapid recharge, broad temperature tolerance, and a substantially smaller footprint than conventional VRLA batteries. The system has completed **HCAI seismic certification** and applicable UL safety testing, while the **2026 edition of NFPA 855 now recognizes hybrid supercapacitors as a distinct technology category**. For healthcare facilities, the technology could provide a lower-maintenance, space-efficient alternative whose service life more closely aligns with the 15 to 20-year lifecycle of UPS and switchgear infrastructure.

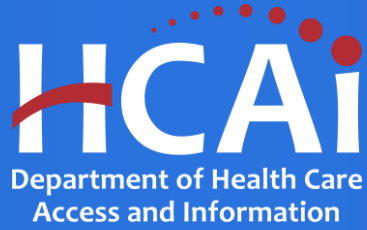

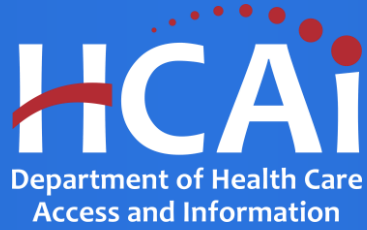

Topic 1 – Update on Wood-Frame Standard Details Prepared by the HBSB Codes and Processes Committee (Gary Dunger, HBSB Member)

- Gary Dunger provided background and updated the work to date by the HBSB Codes and Processes Committee to develop wood-frame connection and framing details for healthcare facilities to standardize their design, review and construction.
- Updates to the details and preparation of CAD drawings are underway that will be submitted for approval by the Codes and Processes Committee, after which a final technical review will be performed by OSHPD. Once this is complete the full package of structural, and fire/life safety details will be submitted to the SNSR. The SNSR will then discuss the details at their meeting for possible endorsement. This will likely happen at the first SNSR meeting of 2027.

Meeting Date: July 29, 2026

Topic 2 – Update on OSHPD OPD Details: Standard Partition Wall (Roy Lobo for Chris Davis; HCAI)

- Roy Lobo summarized previous presented on the significant ASCE 7-22 changes in nonstructural seismic force demands, specifically the F_p (force on a component). ASCE 7-22 now requires that F_p calculations consider building-specific characteristics, such as building period and lateral force resisting system, making the process more complex and less accessible to non-structural design professionals.
- Roy walked the committee through the basis of the changes and some comparisons to NLRHA results. For hospital construction, the changes can result in an increase of about 50 percent in the F_p force for partition walls under 9 feet tall and almost 100% for taller walls, resulting in significant increases to stud sizes to 14 and even 12 gauge in some cases, creating availability and installation concerns.

Topic 2 – Update on OSHPD OPD Details: Standard Partition Wall (Roy Lobo for Chris Davis; HCAI), Cont.

- Roy also believes that there are areas of conservatism in the new requirements, especially for hospital construction. It was also noted that when properly installed, these systems have performed well in past earthquakes.
- An extensive discussion period ensued, with concern expressed by numerous members of the public regarding the additional material costs and limited availability of the thicker studs and the potential issues with constructability.
- Concern was also expressed that the impacts on construction costs were not fully vetted against the potential benefits to seismic safety. OSHPD will continue to work on this issue and plan to provide a proposal to help to mitigate the impact of these changes at a future SNSR meeting.

Meeting Date: July 29, 2026

Topic 3 – Minimum Anchor Qualification Requirements on Post-Installed Anchors in Concrete (Roy Lobo; HCAI)

- Roy made an extensive presentation on the new ACI requirements on post-installed anchors in concrete. Two updated ACI standards (ACI 355.2 and 355.4) were both adopted into the next edition of ASCE 7 and the 2027 IBC. These standards updated their testing protocol for anchor qualification to require good performance of anchors under repeated crack-width cycling and sustained tension loads.
- Roy expressed that OSHPD has concerns regarding the applicability of this updated qualification procedure for anchors typically used for seismic bracing conditions. The changes to the ACI standards will require extensive re-qualification of these anchors.

Topic 3 – Minimum Anchor Qualification Requirements on Post-Installed Anchoars in Concrete (Roy Lobo; HCAI), Cont.

- An extended number of public comments were made by participants in supporting the process used to updates these ACI standards. Others commentors supported the concerns expressed by Dr. Lobo.
- ACI requested the opportunity to respond in writing to the presentation made during the meeting. Their document will be submitted in time to be included with the agenda package for the next SNSR meeting on October 7, 2026.
- Dr. Lobo plans to develop a code change proposal for how OSHPD plans to address the new editions of these two standards in the future editions of the CBC for consideration at the October meeting.

Meeting Date: July 29, 2026

Topic 4 – Drift Scaling Requirement for Equivalent Lateral Force (ELF) and Modal Response Spectrum Analysis (MRSA) when ASCE 7-22, Equation 12.8-7 Governs the Design, (Roy, Lobo; HCAI)

- Roy Lobo presented a discussion on how ASCE 7 presently requires seismic drifts/displacements are checked for conditions which are subject to near fault ground motions when the design is based on either ELF or MRSA base shear procedures. This requirement first found it's way into the codes in the 1997 UBC and has been modified a number of times since. Some new information on this is being considered for ASCE 7-28 which is presently being balloted that will better reflect changes to ground motion spectra development procedures for near field sites.
- At present, this requirement is being considered regardless of soil site class. Roy provided studies from earthquake ground motion spectra and demonstrated that this may need to be reconsidered.

Topic 4 – Drift Scaling Requirement for Equivalent Lateral Force (ELF) and Modal Response Spectrum Analysis (MRSA) when ASCE 7-22, Equation 12.8-7 Governs the Design, (Roy, Lobo; HCAI), Cont.

- Roy also shared an example project from a hospital design where the present procedure was shown to be very conservative for a tall hospital building in San Diego, where the design base shear using MRSA procedures of the code was higher than that of the Maximum Considered Earthquake design requirements when nonlinear response history analysis was used.
- Roy suggested some potential alternatives to address this issue that will be considered in the next meeting of the SNSR.

Meeting Date: July 29, 2026

Topic 5 – Fiber-Reinforced Polymer (FRP) Retrofit Requirements for Reinforced Concrete Shear Walls, Diaphragms, Spandrels and Collectors (Ali Sumer; HCAI)

- Ali Sumer provided a summary of what FRP is and how it is used in seismic retrofit applications. This is a commonly used technique for strengthening and/or increasing the ductility of reinforced concrete elements.
- While commonly used, there are no standards for the design and construction procedures needed to apply this technique. Each project using FRP needs to be approved via an AMOC. OSHPD has developed a set of guidelines to assist engineers. ACI is working to address this in three documents, but this material will not be available to reference in the CBC until 2032 at the earliest.
- OSHPD is planning to develop a program for pre-approval of FRP design criteria, which will incorporate recent testing results from university and private labs.
- Plan is to eventually propose a new section in the CEBC for application of FRP to R/C and R/M.

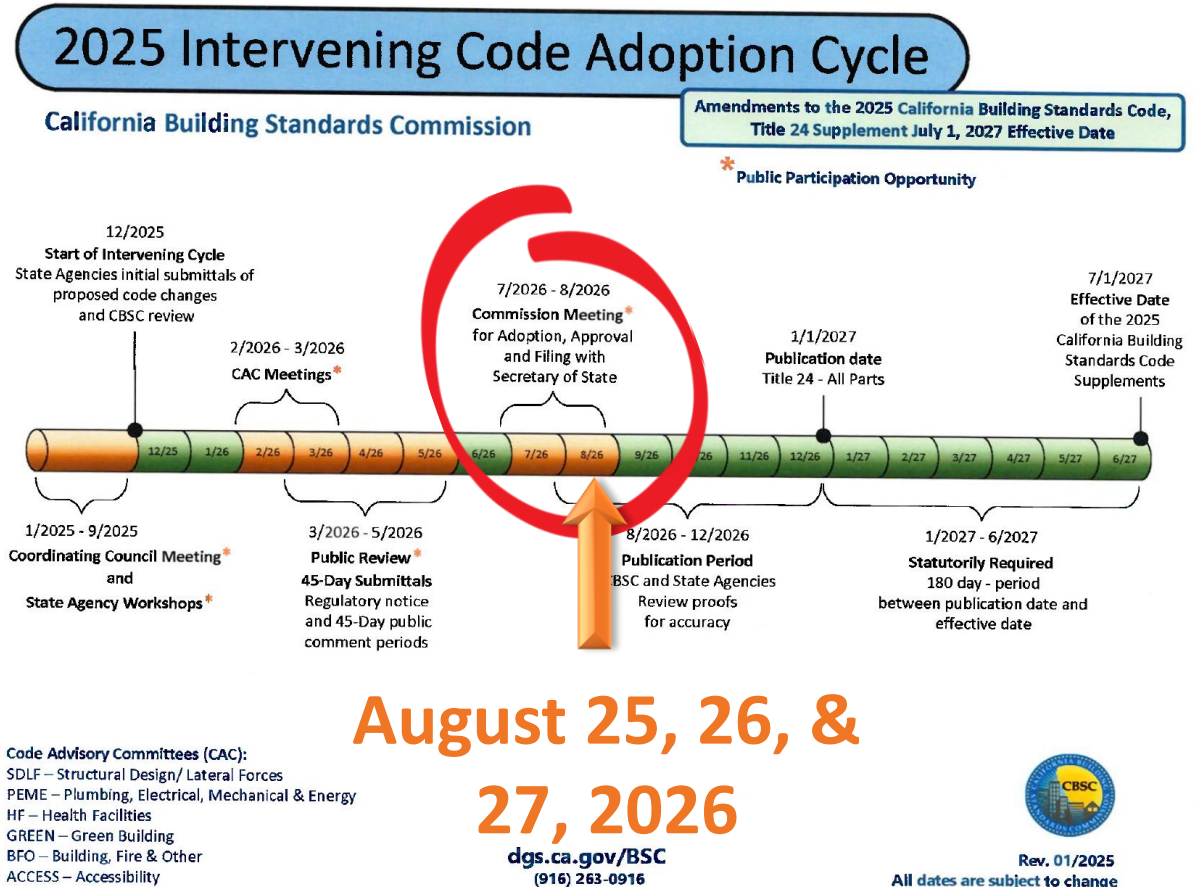

HCAI's Initiative to "Right Size" OSHPD 3 for Alternate Birth Centers (ABCs)

- SB 1832 & AB 55 detached hospital requirements, established ABC licensing/reimbursement criteria, and mandated comprehensive perinatal services with hospital transfer policies.
- **HCAI Right sized OSHPD 3 building standards for Alternate Birth Centers (ABCs) to fit the needs of low-risk birthing environments.**
 - Previous standards tied ABCs to hospital clinic requirements, imposing unnecessary and stringent rules.
 - HCAI is aligning Title 24 building codes, Title 22 licensing, and national standards, identifying burdensome requirements and clarifying applicable CBC Requirements.
- OSHPD's "right sizing" process included:
 - Focus groups with midwives
 - Public meetings for feedback
 - Code modifications to support small/rural clinics
- **This work is vital for rural communities lacking local labor and delivery services—making ABCs more accessible and feasible.**
- **The goal:** Maintain safety while modernizing standards to support equitable, accessible maternity care statewide.



Health and Safety Code §18930

Building standards adopted by state agencies and submitted to the commission for approval shall be accompanied by an analysis written by the adopting agency or state agency that proposes the building standards which shall, to the satisfaction of the commission, justify the approval thereof in terms of the following criteria:

(4) The proposed building standard is not unreasonable, arbitrary, unfair, or capricious, in whole or in part.

(5) The cost to the public is reasonable, based on the overall benefit to be derived from the building standards.

(7) The applicable national specifications, published standards, and model codes have been incorporated therein as provided in this part, where appropriate.

(A) If a national specification, published standard, or model code does not adequately address the goals of the state agency, a statement defining the inadequacy shall accompany the proposed building standard when submitted to the commission.

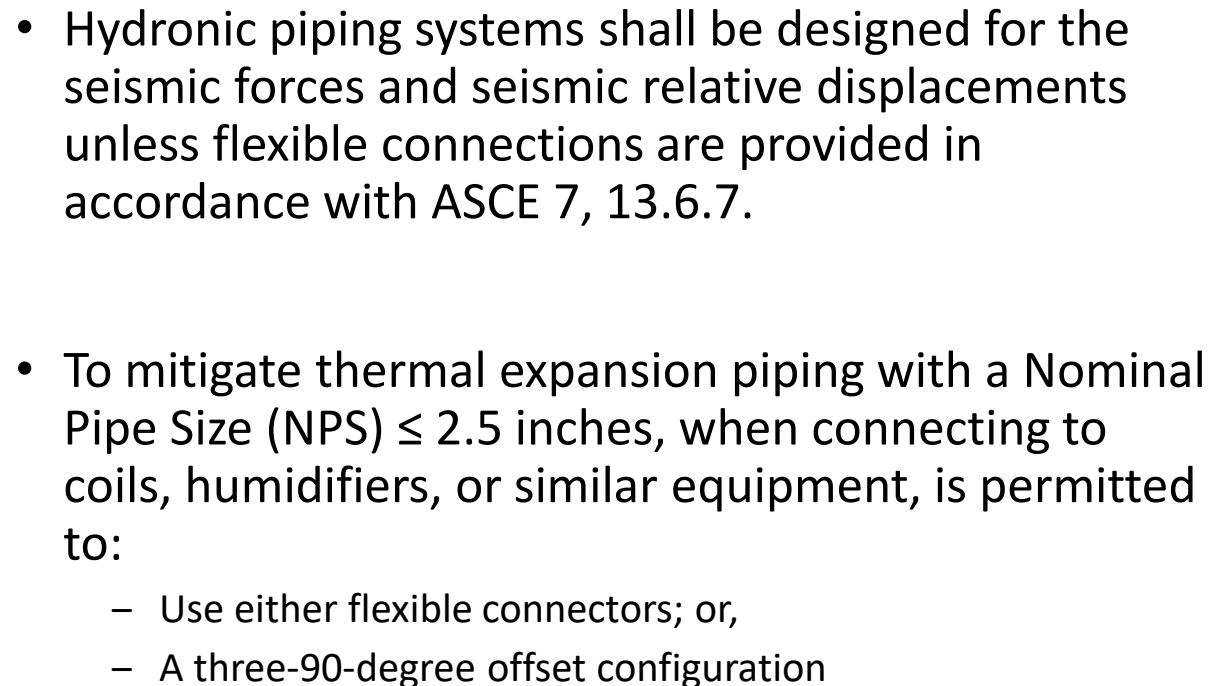

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Code Application Notice (CAN) is to clarify the requirements of sub-acute bed locations related to nursing homes and limited care facilities that admit patients needing sustained electrical life-support equipment. This CAN applies to skilled nursing facility (SNF) projects converting a general care patient bed(s) to sub-acute bed(s) and includes scope of work pertaining to the replacement of a generator or addition of patient bed receptacle(s). Those projects including replacement of a generator or addition of patient bed receptacle(s) in the scope of work, but not converting a general care patient bed(s) to a sub-acute bed(s), will require a note on the drawings stating, "Facility will not admit patients sustained by life support."

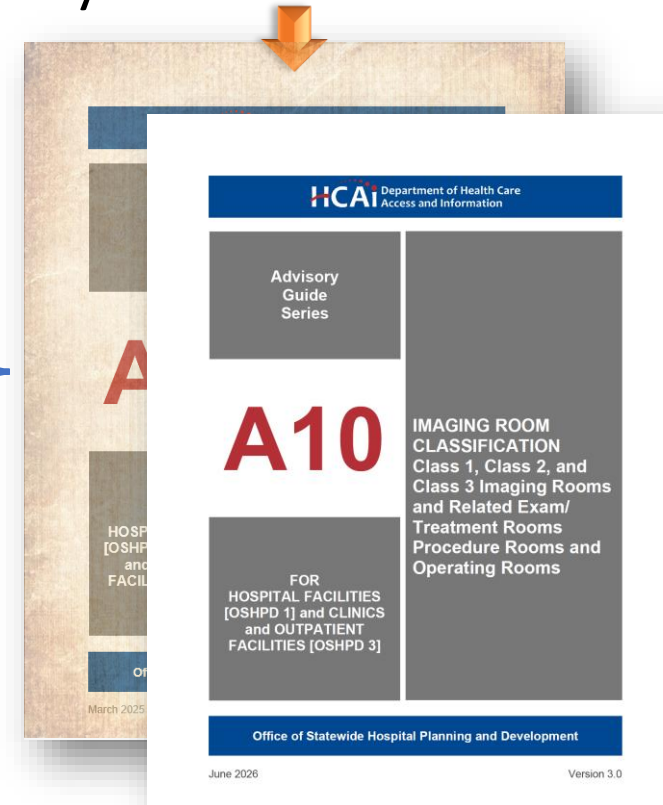

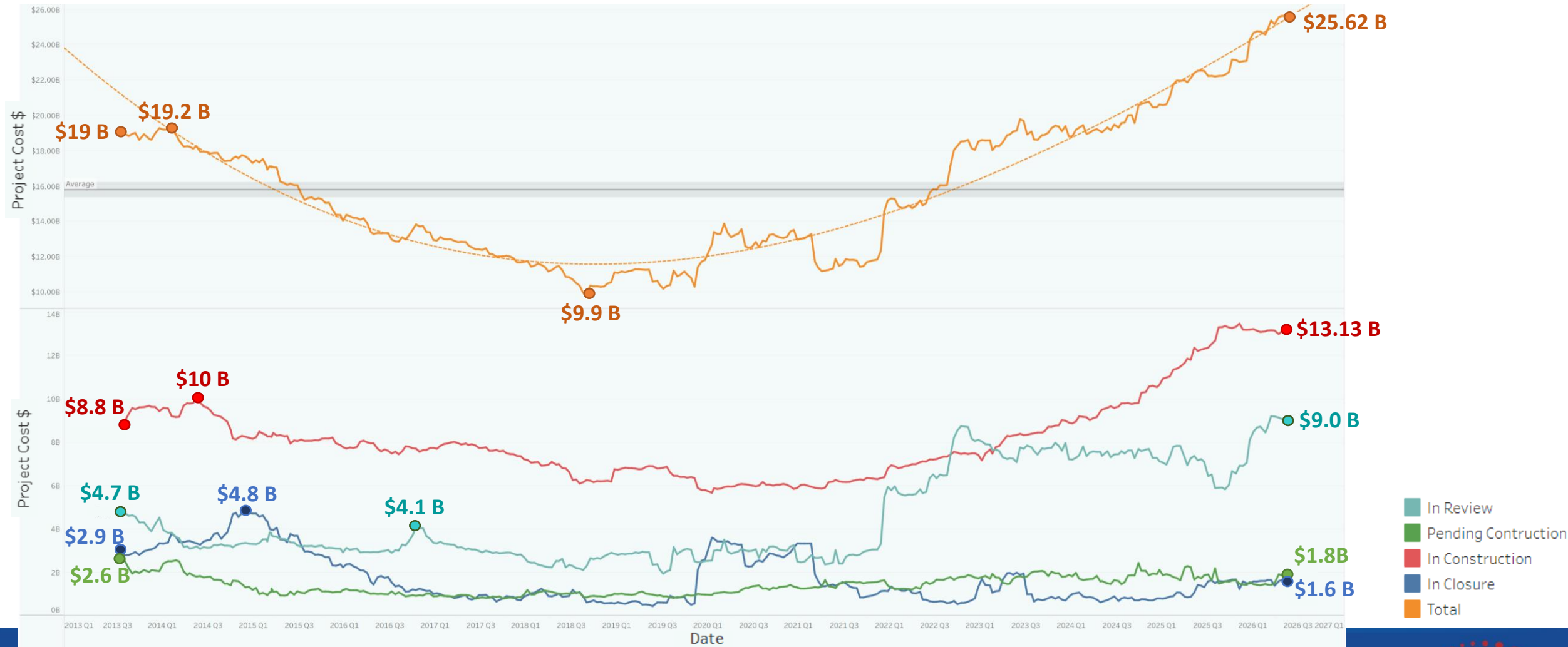

Workload in Construction Costs for Projects Over Time

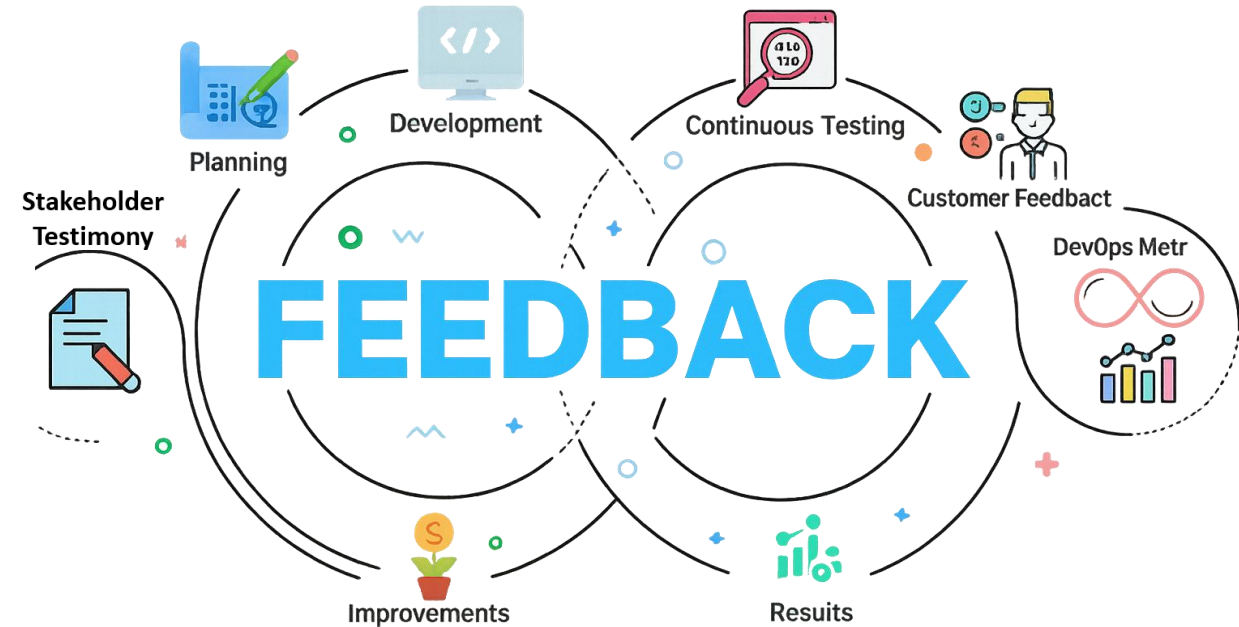

Partition Wall Design Impacts using ASCE 7-22

- New force requirements in ASCE 7-22 have increased the design seismic forces for partition walls in hospital buildings which have doubled in some cases
- Mtl. Stud sizes and anchorage at the top and bottom track have increased resulting in higher costs for material and labor
- For high seismic areas demands are outside the existing range of S_{DS} in the OSHPD Partition Preapproved Design tables (OPD) requiring custom details with 14 gage or even 12 gage studs for conditions C or D

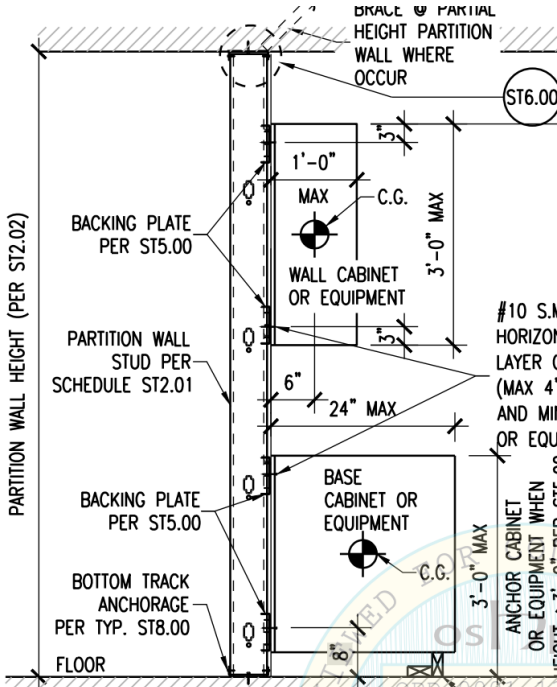

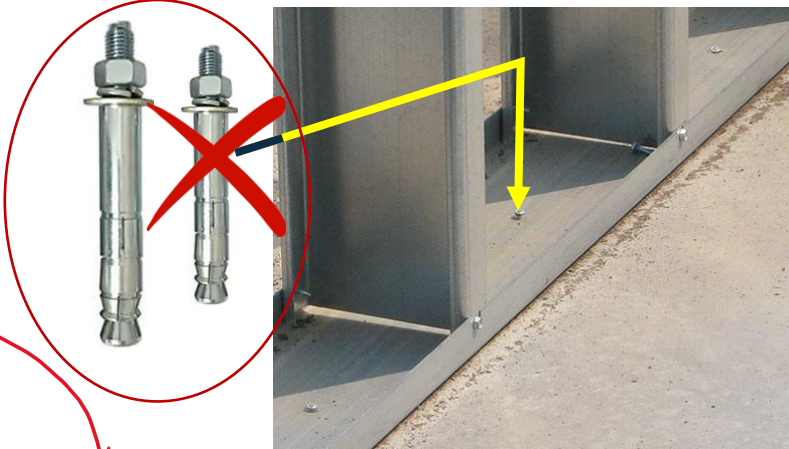

2028 CBC - New Anchor Qualification Requirements

- ACI 318-25 now adopts ACI 355.2 (24) and ACI 355.4 (24) by reference, and ACI 318-25 is adopted by the 2027 IBC
- ACI 355.2 (24) and ACI 355.4 (24) now have a new testing protocol for anchor qualification that requires good performance of anchors under repeated crack width cycling under sustained tension loads.

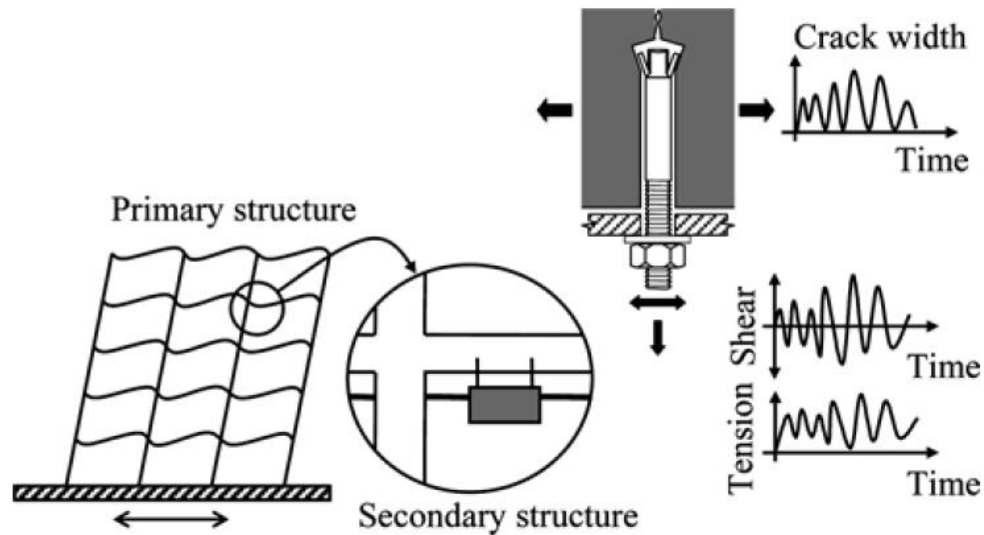


Fig. 1—Actions acting on nonstructural anchorage under earthquake loading.

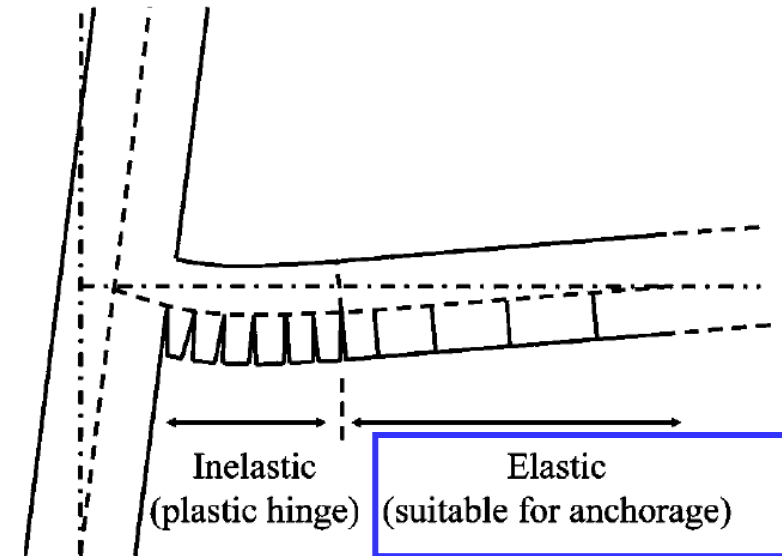


Fig. 2—Idealization of cracking in beam caused by transverse motion of building.

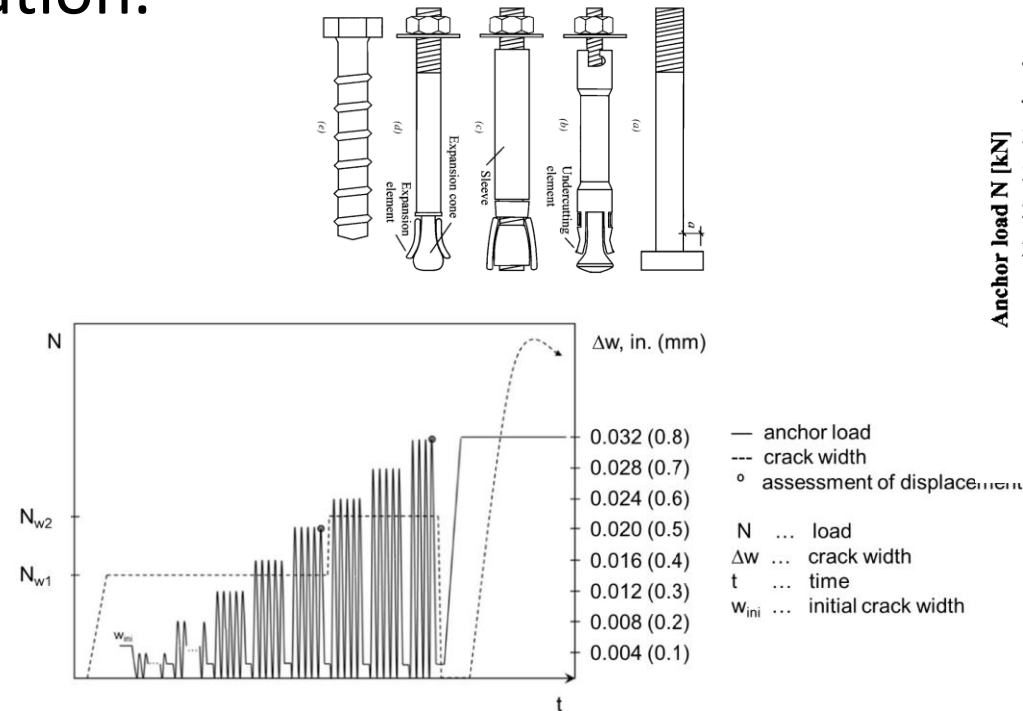
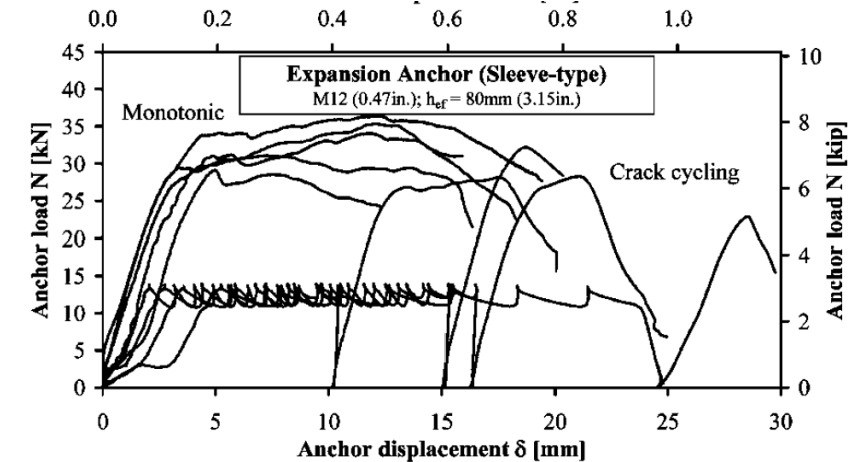
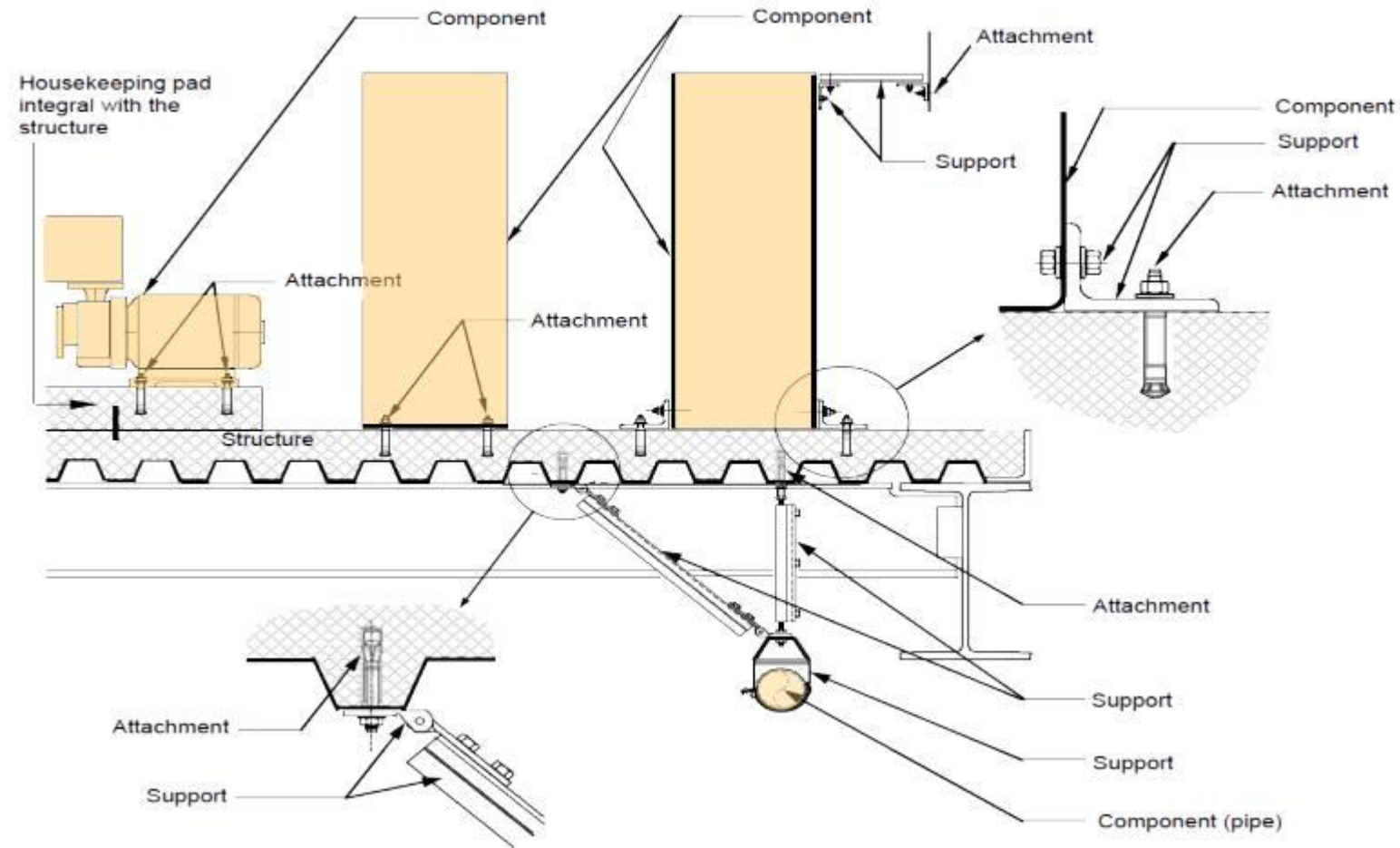


FIGURE 3.12: SCHEMATIC TEST PROCEDURE FOR TEST NO. 5, TABLE 3.2



Typical Anchorage of Nonstructural Components in Concrete



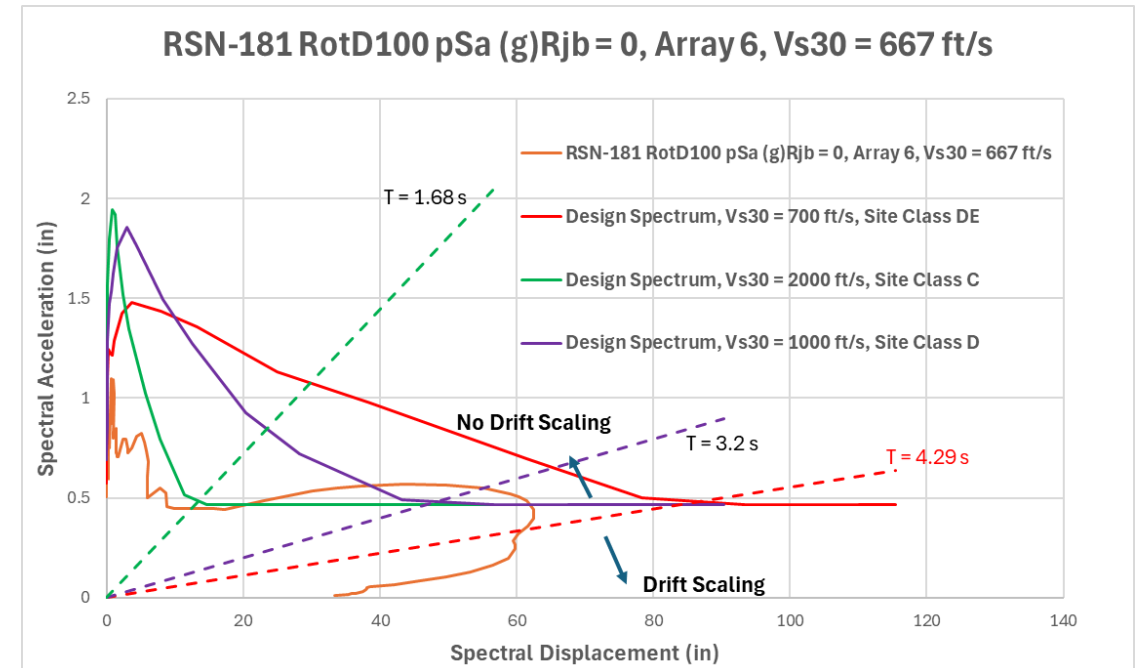
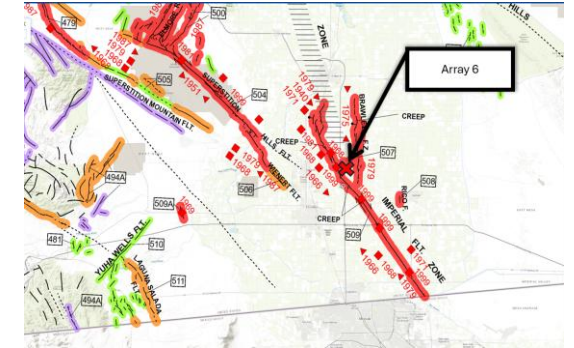
Issues with crack cycling for post installed anchor qualification

- Anchors for floor mounted equipment are not subject to sustained tension loads.
- Anchors to diagonal braces for seismic bracing of distribution systems are not subject to sustained tension.
- Vertical hangers of brace assemblies could support tributary gravity loads and are in sustained tension, but that load is expected to be small relative to the seismic tension. System could be supported by multiple gravity supports not subject to seismic cyclic loads.
- Location where crack cycling is expected to occur will have reinforcement. Not suitable locations for post installed anchors.
- Max. crack open and tension load occur at different times.
- No evidence provided from tests or past earthquake failures to show how the new protocol prevents failures from earthquakes where the current protocol does not.



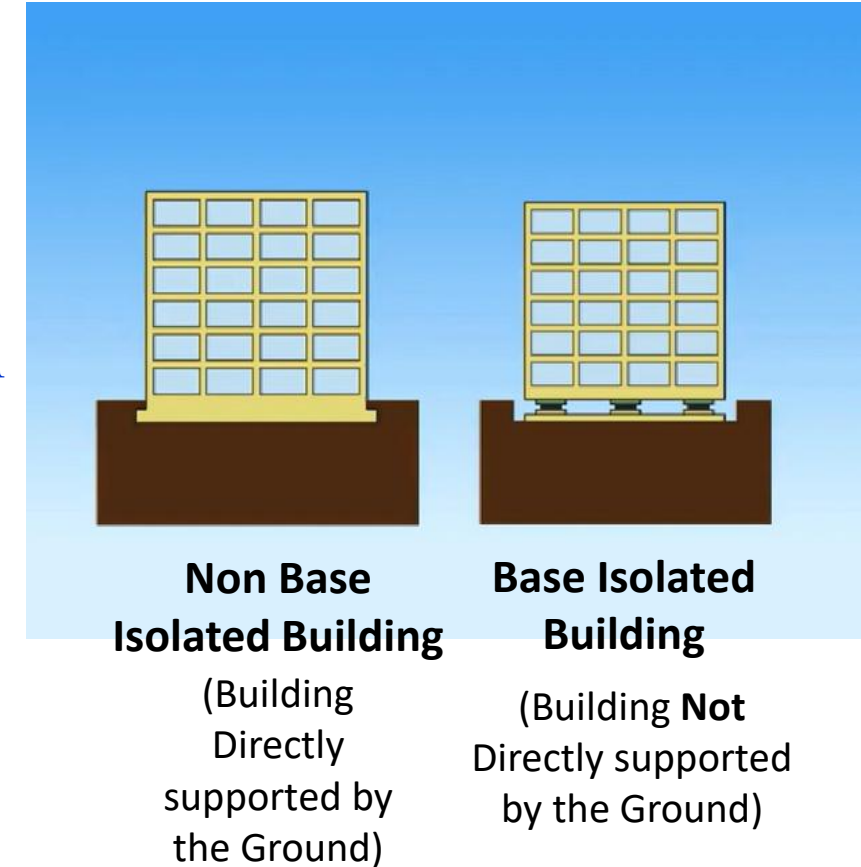
Drift Scaling Requirement for Long Period Buildings

- Designs including scaling for drifts could significantly increase cost.
- Initially introduced in the 1997 UBC to address large displacement and velocity pulses observed in near fault ground motion.
- Due to improvements on seismic detailing new buildings now have improved ductility, propose to limit drift scaling to near fault sites and to Site Classes C or better.



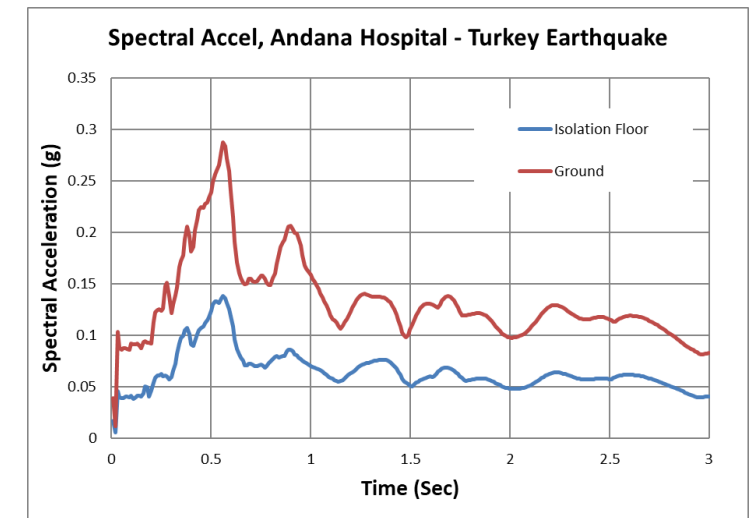
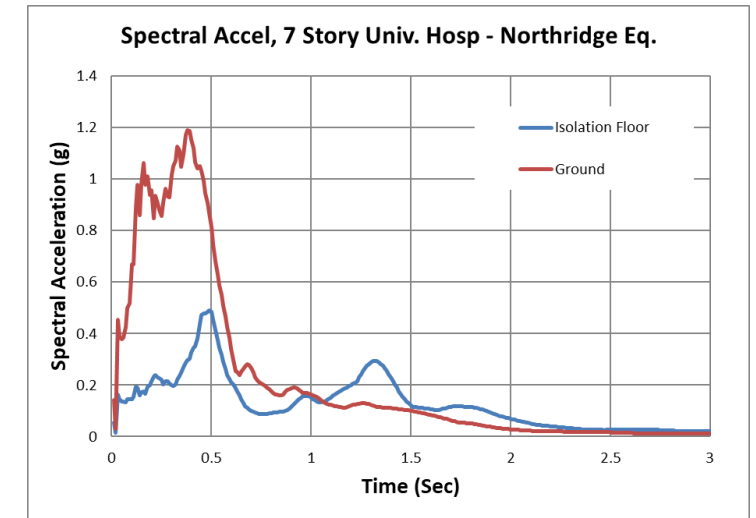
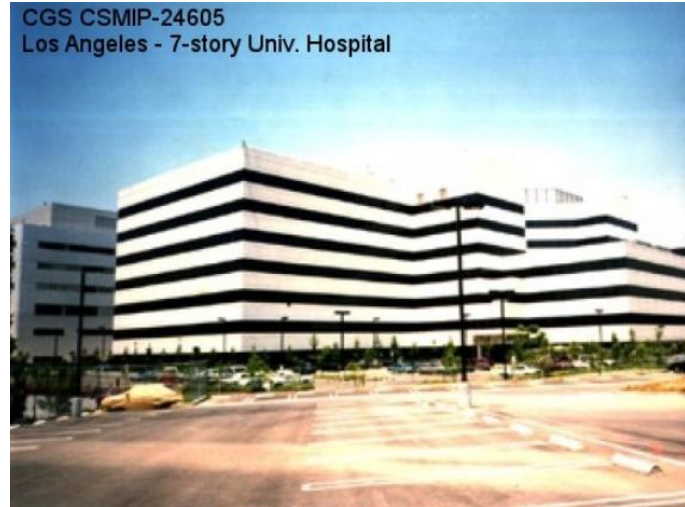
New Base Isolated Buildings

- **Three new Base Isolated Buildings**
- **Research Areas where cost reductions can be realized without adversely impacting safety**
 - Ground Motions leading to large displacements resulting in larger isolators
- Superstructure of base isolated buildings target the MCE earthquake and do not account for the inherent ductility in special systems resulting in essentially elastic designs.
- Optimizing number of nonlinear analyses required but adequately bound the design.

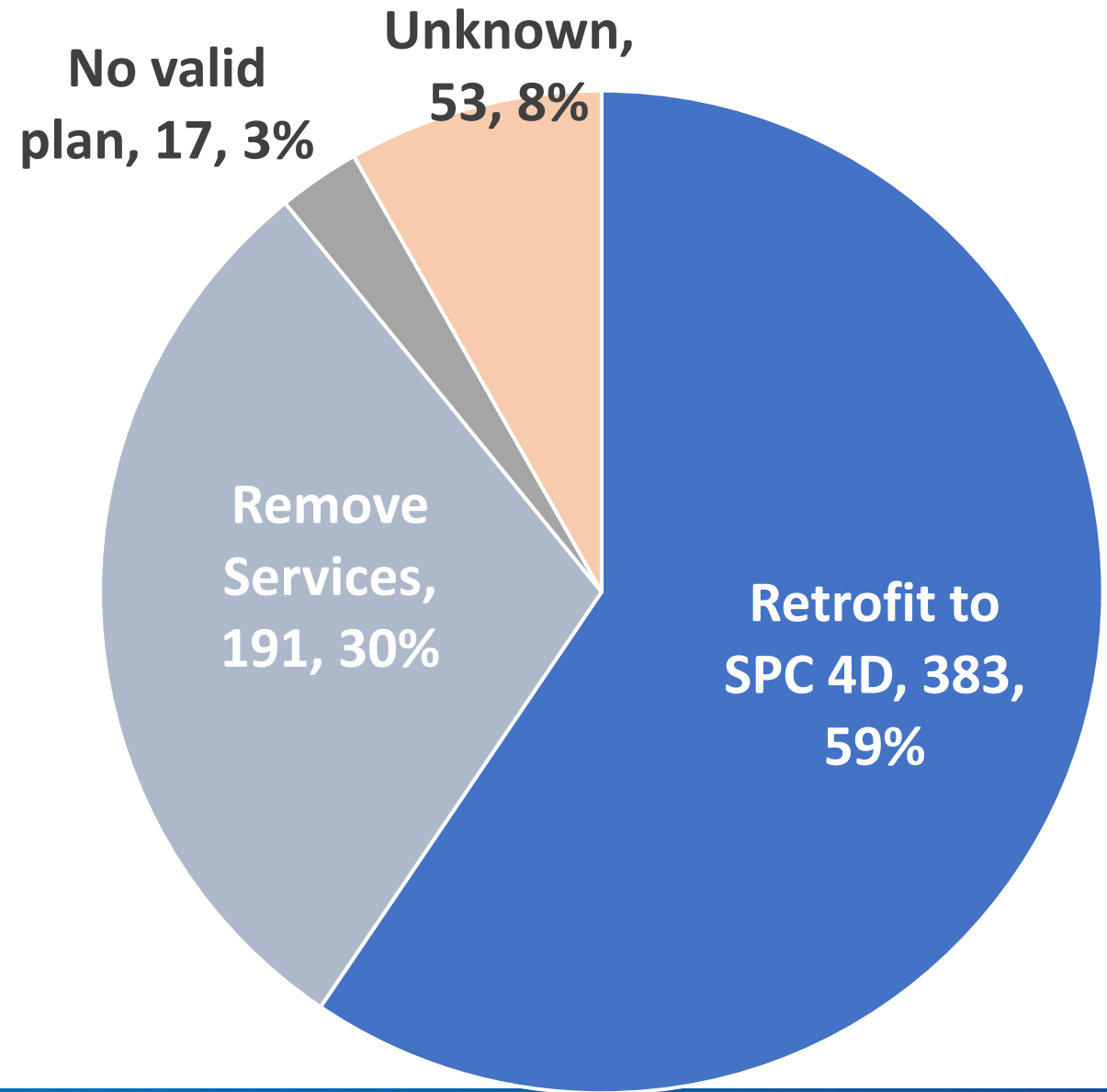

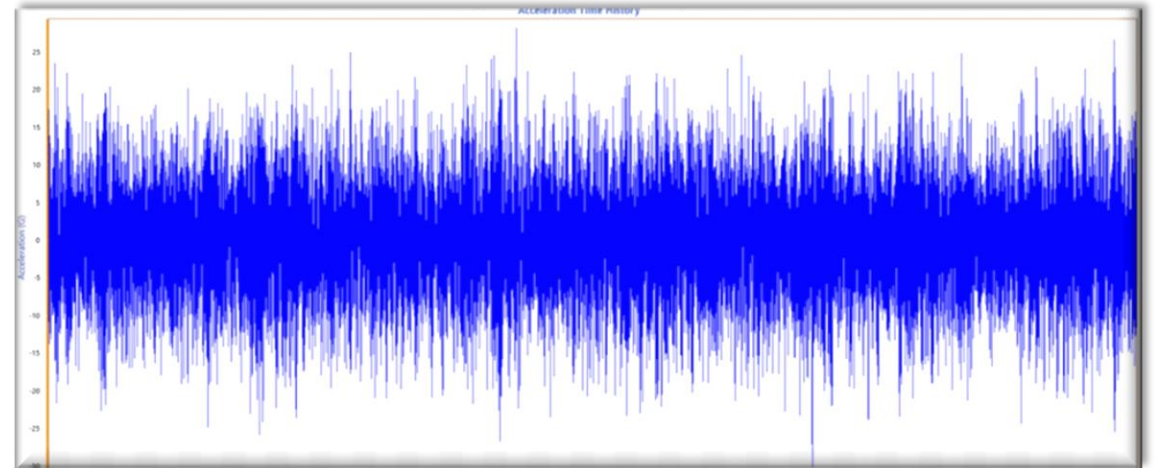

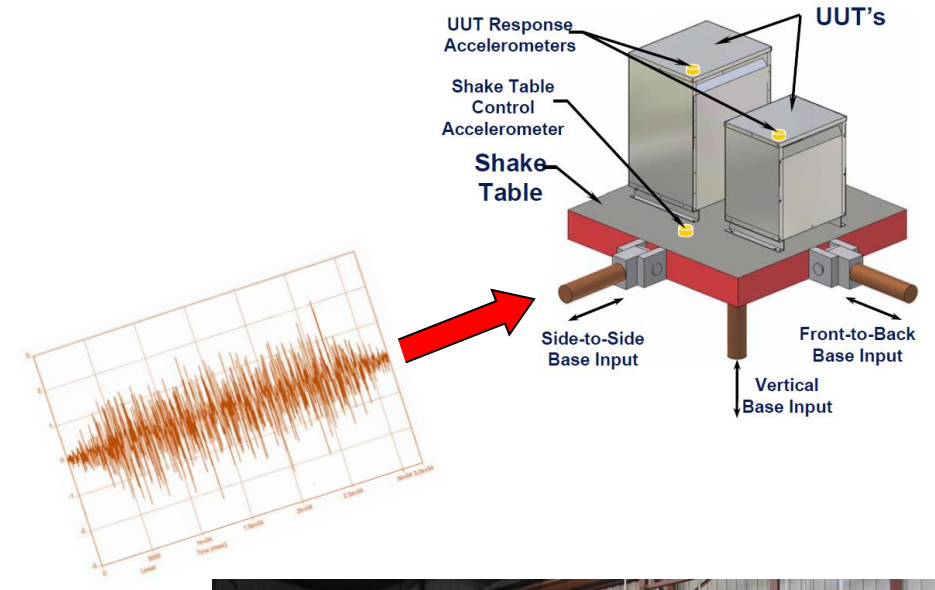
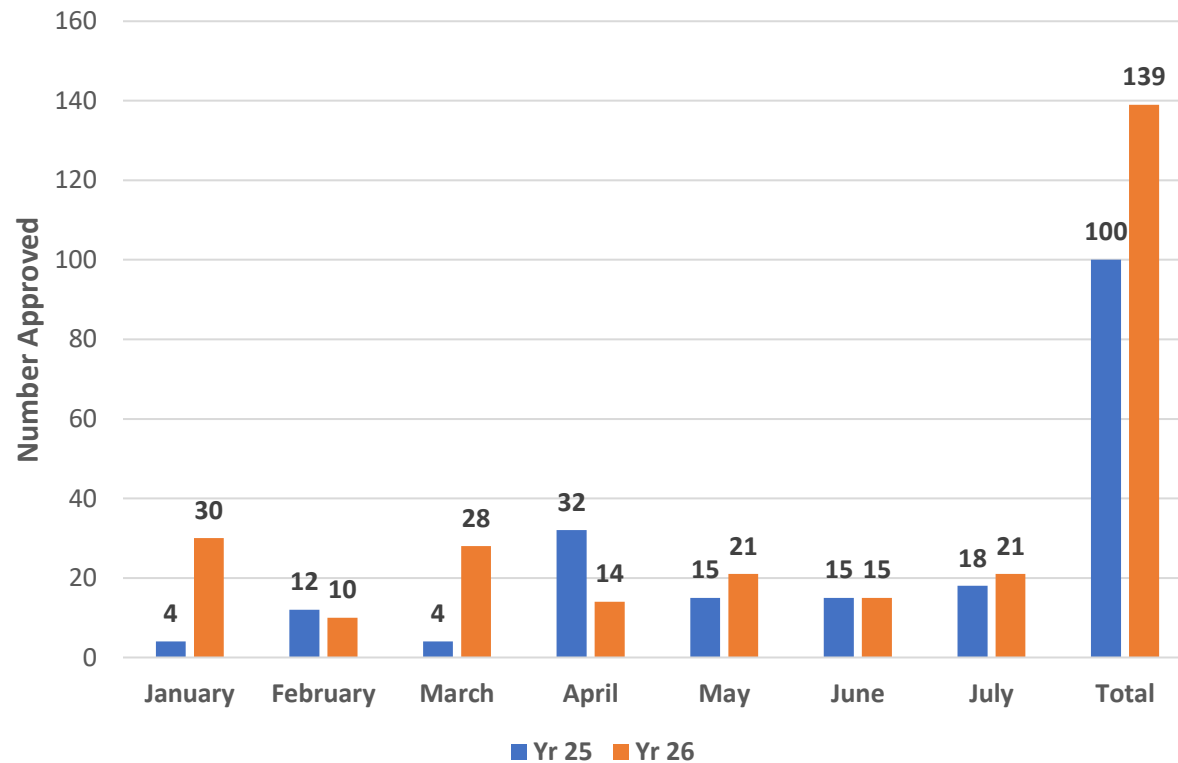

Subject: Mandatory Compliance with Special Seismic Certification and Equipment Labeling Requirements

This memorandum formally notifies all manufacturers that equipment and components supplied for installation in projects under the jurisdiction of the Office of Statewide Hospital Planning and Development (OSHDP) – specifically, California hospitals and skilled nursing facilities – must comply with the special seismic certification and labeling requirements outlined in Chapter 17 or 17A of the California Building Code (CBC), as applicable.

The CBC mandates special seismic certification for certain nonstructural components and equipment within the Designated Seismic System in California hospitals and skilled nursing facilities. In addition to certification through approved testing methodologies, the CBC requires that each unit has a permanent, durable label affixed directly to the equipment. (See CBC Section 1703.5 or 1703A.5, as applicable, for Labeling requirements.)

Are UL 969 Labels Acceptable?

- OSHPD accepts labels applied in-plant under the manufacturer's control that comply with UL 969 for outdoor use, provided they meet the necessary durability and permanence criteria.
- Paper-based labels that only meet UL 969 indoor installation requirements are unacceptable.

Are Field Testing Required for UL 969 Labels?

- No additional testing is required for UL 969 labels rated for outdoor use, provided they meet the specified durability and permanence criteria.
- "Durability and permanence" refers to ensuring the **label is applied to an appropriate substrate, free from air bubbles or other surface imperfections** that could hinder proper attachment. Special inspectors can visually verify this in accordance with CBC 2025 Section 1705A.13.4.

*Why Insist on UL 969 **Outdoor** Labels?*

- For outdoor UL 969 compliance, manufacturers use highly durable synthetic alternatives with a paper-like, printable finish. **Common materials include polyester (PET), vinyl (PVC), and polypropylene**, as these are far more resistant to tearing, moisture, and chemicals than paper labels.
- UL 969 covers **paper labels for indoor use**, where extreme durability is not required. However, our field conditions—including exposure to sunlight, rain, snow, condensation, temperature cycles, humidity, and windborne contaminants—mean that even occasional exposure **necessitates an outdoor-rated** label. This level of exposure is inevitable given how labels are handled and used in our projects.

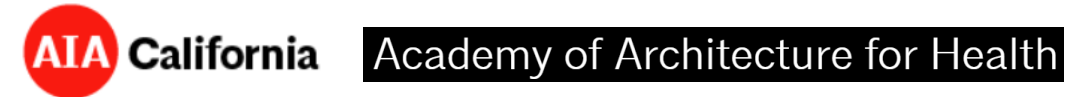
Why Accept UL 969 Labels?

- UL 969 tests the entire labeling system. The UL 969-approved label must be paired with a compatible ribbon or ink system and printed using an approved method to maintain certification.
- UL 969 Label consider both the surface material to which the label will be applied and the expected environmental conditions.

Outreach
