Exhibit A

OVERVIEW OF THE SHARP HEALTHCARE SYSTEM

General

Sharp HealthCare is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation (the “Corporation”), with its corporate offices in San Diego, California. The Corporation is the sole member, sole shareholder, or majority shareholder of the affiliated entities discussed below, which together constitute an integrated health care delivery system known, and referred to herein, as “Sharp HealthCare”. The Corporation and its affiliated entities currently own or lease and operate a variety of facilities and programs throughout San Diego County (the “County”), which is home to a population of approximately 3.3 million. Sharp HealthCare comprises:

- Four licensed acute care hospitals
- Two licensed specialty hospitals
- Twenty-three outpatient clinics operated in conjunction with two of its three affiliated medical groups
- Seven urgent care centers
- Four freestanding ambulatory surgery centers
- Three skilled nursing facilities
- Two inpatient acute rehabilitation programs
- Hospice, home infusion, and specialty pharmacy programs
- Numerous outpatient facilities and programs
- A nonprofit health maintenance organization (“HMO”)

As of September 30, 2025, Sharp HealthCare was licensed for 2,230 beds, had approximately 2,700 physicians on medical staffs and in affiliated medical groups, and employed approximately 20,000 people. For fiscal year ended and as of September 30, 2025, Sharp HealthCare reported approximately \$5.5 billion in revenues and approximately \$9.3 billion in assets. In fiscal years 2024 and 2023, revenue was approximately \$5.1 billion and \$4.7 billion, respectively.

With a commitment to serving the community, Sharp HealthCare provides services along the continuum of care offering ambulatory, acute, and post-acute care services. For the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, Sharp HealthCare served over 95,000 inpatients and 1 million outpatients, treated nearly 350,000 emergency cases, provided 1.5 million physician visits, brought more than 11,700 new lives into this world, and performed over 57,000 surgeries. Sharp HealthCare has a level two trauma center, one of the largest neonatal intensive care units (“NICU”) in California, and a nationally recognized hospice program. Sharp HealthCare has been an innovator and leader in areas such as cardiovascular, neuroscience, orthopedic, and oncology services, multi-organ transplantation, hyperbaric medicine, and minimally invasive robotics surgery. Sharp HealthCare has three affiliated medical groups representing more than 600 primary care and 1,200 specialist physicians and advance practice providers, resulting in physician integration and coordinated patient management across the care continuum. Sharp Health Plan provides health care coverage to small and large businesses, including Sharp HealthCare employees and their dependents, individual HMO coverage, – through the Covered California exchange (the “Exchange”) and directly to consumers – as well as Medicare Advantage for a total of more than 170,000 HMO enrollees as of September 30, 2025. Sharp HealthCare has been accepting capitated payments since 1985 and has decades of experience as a highly-integrated health care delivery system.

The Corporation’s affiliated entities include:

- Sharp Memorial Hospital (“Sharp Memorial”);
- Sharp Chula Vista Medical Center (“Sharp Chula Vista”);
- Grossmont Hospital Corporation (“Sharp Grossmont”);
- Sharp Coronado Hospital and Healthcare Center (“Sharp Coronado”);
- Sharp Health Plan;
- Continuous Quality Insurance, Segregated Portfolio Corporation (“Continuous Quality Insurance”);
- Sharp HealthCare Foundation (“Sharp Foundation”);
- Grossmont Hospital Foundation (“Grossmont Foundation”); and
- Sharp Freestanding Surgery, LLC (“Sharp Surgery”).

The Corporation is the sole member of the aforementioned affiliated entities, with the exception of Grossmont Foundation, whose sole member is Sharp Grossmont; Continuous Quality Insurance, where the Corporation is the sole shareholder; and Sharp Surgery, where the Corporation owns 90% and an ambulatory surgery center (“ASC”) management company owns the remaining 10%. The Corporation operates the Sharp Rees-Stealy Medical Centers (“Sharp Rees-Stealy”) and the SharpCare Medical Offices (“SharpCare”) as medical foundation divisions of the Corporation.

In its fiscal year ended September 30, 2024, Sharp HealthCare provided \$622.6 million in community benefit programs and services that were unreimbursed. The following table summarizes the estimated net cost to Sharp HealthCare of providing programs and services for vulnerable populations and for the broader community in fiscal year 2024:

Governance

The Corporation is governed by a Board of Directors (the “Board”) consisting of no less than 19 and no more than 27 members, including three *ex officio* members (“*Ex Officio* Directors”). *Ex Officio* Directors serve by virtue of their positions with the Corporation (i.e., President/CEO and Immediate Past Chair) or with the Sharp Foundation (i.e., Chair of the Board). All Board members have the right to vote on matters considered by the Board, subject to the Corporation’s conflict of interest policy. Regular meetings of the Board are held bi-monthly.

In addition to the *Ex Officio* Directors, one director from each of the following affiliated entities is designated (each a “Designated Director” and collectively the “Designated Directors”) by their respective governing boards: Sharp Memorial, Sharp Chula Vista, Sharp Grossmont, and Sharp Coronado. Additionally, Sharp Rees-Stealy Medical Group (“SRSMG”) and Sharp Community Medical Group (“SCMG”) each designate (subject to Board approval) a physician to serve as a Designated Director. The remaining members are elected by the Board for three-year terms (up to a maximum of nine years of consecutive service) from a slate of nominees presented by the Board’s Nominating, Bylaws, and

Governance Committee. Up to one-third of the members of the Board may be physicians. At present, a total of six members of the Board are physicians. Christopher D. Howard serves as President and Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and utilizes a senior executive team to manage day-to-day activities and to generate strategic opportunities for the Corporation and its affiliated entities.

The Board of the Corporation elects the members of the governing bodies (other than designated directors or *ex officio* directors) of certain affiliated entities and generally may remove without cause and/or replace governing body members. Each governing body is responsible for oversight of the day-to-day operations of its respective facilities and coordination of its strategic initiatives, budget preparation, and capital expenditures with the Corporation. In aggregate, approximately 120 individuals serve on the governing boards of Sharp HealthCare affiliated entities.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

This section provides an overview of the health care services and programs offered by the Corporation and each affiliated entity.

Corporation

The Corporation provides the centralized administrative and management functions of Sharp HealthCare and its affiliated entities and also provides health care services through the Sharp Rees-Stealy and SharpCare operating divisions. The centralized management services to its affiliated entities include IT, finance, strategic planning, marketing, business development, facility management, public affairs, legal, risk management, human resources, patient financial services, clinical effectiveness, managed care contracting, supply chain management, nurse call center, centralized patient placement, internal audit, corporate compliance, and other services.

Sharp Rees-Stealy

Programs and Services. The Corporation operates the multispecialty medical clinics and six urgent care centers throughout the County as a medical foundation doing business as Sharp Rees-Stealy. Services include primary care, specialty care, urgent care, laboratory, radiology, physical therapy and pharmacy services. In addition, the occupational health program provides a full range of services including injury and illness treatment, rehabilitation, physical examinations, and other programs designed to evaluate, treat and prevent work-related injuries.

Medical Services. The Corporation has entered into a contract with SRSMG to provide professional medical, surgical and other ambulatory services at Sharp Rees-Stealy through December 31, 2030. These services are provided through 17 clinics throughout the County, which are owned or leased by the Corporation and managed by the Corporation. Physician visits totaled over 1.4 million for the year ended September 30, 2025. SRSMG is accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care (“AAAHC”), an industry benchmark for measuring quality. In 2024, SRSMG was surveyed by AAAHC and earned the highest rating of “substantial compliance,” receiving a three-year accreditation. Additionally, SRSMG is accredited by NCQA for Population Health Management.

SharpCare

Programs and Services. The Corporation operates primary care medical offices as a part of its medical foundation doing business as SharpCare. There are currently six locations in the Central, East, and South Bay regions of the County, with the plan to expand in the communities

throughout San Diego. SharpCare provides professional medical services for Sharp HospiceCare and its hospice homes.

Medical Services. The Corporation has entered into a contract with SharpCare Medical Group (“SMG”) to provide professional medical and other ambulatory services through September 30, 2026. These services are provided at six primary care medical offices, which are leased and managed by the Corporation. Physician visits totaled over 49,000 for the year ended September 30, 2025.

Sharp Memorial

General. Sharp Memorial includes the Donald N. Sharp Memorial Community Hospital (“Memorial Hospital”), Stephen Birch Healthcare Center at Sharp Memorial Hospital (“Stephen Birch Center”), Sharp Mary Birch Hospital for Women & Newborns (“Sharp Mary Birch”), Sharp Mesa Vista Hospital (“Sharp Mesa Vista”), Sharp McDonald Center, and James S. Brown Pavilion (“Sharp Outpatient Pavilion”). The collective facilities operated by Sharp Memorial include the 656-bed quaternary care Memorial Hospital and Stephen Birch Center, the 206-bed women and newborns hospital Sharp Mary Birch, the 160-bed psychiatric facility Sharp Mesa Vista, the 16-bed chemical dependency recovery hospital Sharp McDonald Center, and the approximately 122,500 square foot Sharp Outpatient Pavilion.

Sharp Memorial is the largest non-university, quaternary care hospital campus in the County, providing a comprehensive range of primary, secondary, and specialized quaternary medical and surgical care to a diverse geographic distribution of patients residing in the City of San Diego and surrounding communities in the County. Memorial Hospital is a County-designated level two trauma center. Sharp Memorial remained the market share leader in Sharp HealthCare’s primary market area with a market share of 12.5% in 2023.

Programs and Services. Sharp Memorial provides a broad range of programs and services to patients in its service area. Listed below are descriptions of selected major programs and services provided at Sharp Memorial facilities.

- **Cancer Treatment.** Memorial Hospital is one of three Sharp HealthCare hospitals to be recognized as an Integrated Network Cancer Program and to achieve the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer (“ACoSCoC”) accreditation for cancer surgery and care in an inpatient setting. Additionally, Memorial Hospital achieved designation by the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers (the “NAPBC”). In September 2015, Memorial Hospital opened the Laurel Amtower Cancer Institute and Neuro-Oncology Center, a multi-disciplinary program with expert care from neurosurgeons, medical oncologists, radiation oncologists, neurologists, neuropathologists, and neuroradiologists. These highly specialized experts work together to offer the latest cancer-fighting technologies and surgical techniques to create a custom care plan personalized for each patient. Support services provide nurse navigation to offer advocacy, guidance, and coordination of care services, social work to help patients and loved ones cope with their diagnosis, genetic counseling to help identify inherited cancer risk, dietitians, and access to leading-edge clinical trials for brain tumor treatments. In addition, Sharp Memorial has an outpatient infusion center, offering accessible and convenient care for patients requiring a variety of intravenous and medical treatments.

- *Cardiac Care.* In 1957, the first cardiac catheterization in San Diego was performed at Memorial Hospital, followed by the County’s first open-heart surgery a year later. Since that time, the Heart and Vascular Center at Sharp Memorial, with four cardiac catheterization laboratories and a hybrid procedure room, has treated patients with heart conditions such as congestive heart failure, heart attacks, hypertension, angina/chest pain, and valve disease. Every year, Sharp HealthCare physicians and staff perform more than 9,400 cardiac catheterizations and structural heart procedures, including open-heart surgeries and minimally invasive procedures like transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR). The Heart and Vascular Center at Sharp Memorial is ranked fourth among the County hospitals and fifteenth in California for its volume of cardiovascular discharges.¹ Memorial Hospital provides the full spectrum of cardiovascular care including multimodality intervention, electrophysiology, noninvasive diagnosis, acute care, cardiac rehabilitation, and prevention and education. Sharp Memorial is established as a County-designated ST-Elevation Myocardial Infarction (“STEMI”) center, providing streamlined and optimized treatment for heart attack patients.
- *Transplant Services.* Sharp Memorial implemented its heart transplant program in 1985, when Memorial Hospital became San Diego’s first hospital to perform a heart transplant. More than three decades later, Memorial Hospital remains a leader in transforming the lives of patients with end stage heart failure. In total, surgeons at Memorial Hospital have performed more than 500 heart transplants and the transplant survival rates are consistently above the national average. Since its inception, this program’s success rate at one and three years’ post-transplant has been higher than the State and national averages.² In 1987, Memorial Hospital was the first hospital on the West Coast to use the mechanical Jarvik-7 heart for patients awaiting a transplant. In 2008, Memorial Hospital became one of the first facilities in the United States to receive advanced certification in ventricular assist devices for destination therapy by The Joint Commission. Sharp Memorial is now nationally known for its mechanical assist device program and for its national research for this procedure. In addition to heart transplants, Sharp Memorial is accredited to perform kidney and kidney-pancreas transplants from living and deceased donors. Its living donor kidney program is nationally recognized as a Donor Care Network Center for Excellence. Sharp Memorial also supports bone marrow and liver transplants through a joint program with University of California San Diego Health.
- *Trauma Services.* Memorial Hospital is part of the San Diego Regional Trauma Program, comprised of five County adult centers and one pediatric center, and is certified by the San Diego County Emergency Medical System and the American College of Surgeons. In fiscal year 2025, more than 2,500 trauma patients were evaluated and treated at Memorial Hospital.³
- *Women’s Health.* In order to provide for the continued growth of perinatal services, the six-story Sharp Mary Birch opened in October 1992 as a division of Sharp Memorial. Sharp Mary Birch is the largest and most extensive freestanding center for women’s health in Southern California, and the only women’s hospital in the County, offering a variety of alternatives for the birthing experience including conventional delivery, labor/delivery/recovery, and cesarean delivery. The Level III, 84-bed NICU at Sharp Mary Birch provides care for premature and seriously ill infants, including special ventilatory management to infants with severe respiratory distress syndrome and ranks as the County’s market leader in neonatology.⁴ Currently,

approximately 6,400 births occur annually at Sharp Mary Birch, ranking it number three in California. Aside from obstetrical and neonatal care, Sharp Mary Birch offers a full range of inpatient and outpatient medical and surgical gynecological services, including robotic gynecologic surgery and oncology, as well as plastic surgery, extensive health education, and prevention and support services, and is the market leader in the County in three of the four service lines that compose Women's Services – women's obstetrics, normal newborns, and neonatology.⁴ In 2013, Sharp Mary Birch launched the Neonatal Research Institute with a \$2.9 million grant from the National Institutes of Health ("NIH"), Sharp HealthCare's first NIH grant. In 2017, Sharp Mary Birch opened the Nemeth NICU Follow-Up Clinic to further its research and to provide follow-up care to high-risk neonates and, in 2018, expanded its services through the receipt of a \$1.0 million philanthropic gift.

- *Behavioral Health.* With 160 beds, Sharp Mesa Vista is the largest psychiatric hospital in the County, with a market share of 17.9% in 2023, and one of the largest privately operated psychiatric hospital in California. Sharp Mesa Vista is also one of only three significant hospital providers of behavioral health services to the County's child and adolescent population. It has been a provider of psychiatric and substance abuse recovery services for more than 60 years. Sharp Mesa Vista provides a full continuum of behavioral health services, including inpatient, outpatient, and partial hospital programs, with specialized services designed for children, adolescents, adults, and seniors experiencing anxiety, bipolar disorder, depression, eating disorders, and other conditions. Sharp Mesa Vista provides outpatient behavioral health services at two locations throughout the County and handled nearly 56,000 outpatient visits during fiscal year 2025.
- *Chemical Dependency Treatment.* The 16-bed freestanding alcohol and drug treatment facility at Sharp McDonald Center is the only medically supervised chemical dependency recovery hospital in the County and offers one of the most comprehensive recovery programs in Southern California. A variety of recovery options are offered including medically monitored detoxification and rehabilitation, residential programs, partial hospitalization, day and evening intensive outpatient programming offering medication assisted treatment, and an aftercare program that extends recovery into a lifelong process. The Medicated Assistance Treatment Program became available in 2019 to help patients with opioid and other addictions, allowing patients to continue to work while receiving treatment on an outpatient basis.
- *Rehabilitative Services.* The 30-bed Sharp Allison deRose Rehabilitation Center was originally dedicated in 1962 and was the first comprehensive rehabilitation center south of Los Angeles. Today, the center includes the County's largest brain and spinal injury treatment program. The staff at the center address the unique needs of individuals affected by catastrophic injury or debilitating illness by focusing on patients' abilities, not disabilities, and preparing them to live as independently as possible. The center is accredited by Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities ("CARF") for the spinal cord injury program. This accreditation represents the highest level of accreditation that can be awarded to an organization and shows the center's substantial conformance to the standards established by CARF.
- *Robotic Surgery.* In 2005, Memorial Hospital became the first in San Diego at which robotic-assisted surgery was performed using the da Vinci® surgical system and the Stryker Mako Orthopedic System®. Compared to conventional surgical techniques, robot-assisted surgery provides physicians more precision, flexibility, and control for many types of complex and delicate procedures. This type of minimally invasive surgery can result in fewer complications, less pain and blood loss, a shorter hospital stay, and a quicker recovery. In June 2023, Sharp HealthCare was named a Network of Excellence in Robotic Surgery by Surgical Review

Corporation (“SRC”) which includes its five Centers of Excellence in Robotic Surgery, nine different specialties, and 30 Surgeons of Excellence candidates, marking SRC’s first Network of Excellence designation on the West Coast.

- *Outpatient Services.* The Sharp Outpatient Pavilion, which opened on the Sharp Memorial campus in April 2003, is a comprehensive, multidisciplinary outpatient facility providing services including diagnostic imaging, surgical and endoscopy services, cancer treatment, a women’s outpatient imaging center, ophthalmology and vision laser centers, a wellness center, and a variety of other specialty services. The facility houses 12 surgery suites, radiation therapy, 64-slice computed tomography (“CT”) body scanning, positron emission tomography (“PET”) services, digital mammography, and computerized radiology, including a picture archival and communication system (PACS) that provides the infrastructure for a film-less radiology system. The new Heart and Lung Clinic opened in October 2023 to focus on key service lines for Sharp Memorial.

Sharp Chula Vista

General. Sharp Chula Vista is a general acute-care hospital serving the South Bay region of the County. It operates 349 acute care beds and a 100-bed skilled nursing facility in the attached Birch Patrick Convalescent Center (“Birch Patrick”). Sharp Chula Vista originated as Chula Vista Hospital, a nursing home founded in 1944. Licensed the following year to provide acute care services, the hospital expanded over time in line with local population growth. In 1975, this growth afforded the hospital an opportunity to relocate to its existing location in a new facility. Known at that time as the Community Hospital of Chula Vista, Sharp Chula Vista gained its current name after affiliating with Sharp HealthCare in 1989.

Today, Sharp Chula Vista ranks as the largest and busiest hospital in the South Bay.¹ For more than two decades, Sharp Chula Vista has led all South Bay hospitals in terms of inpatient market share, patient volume growth, admissions, emergency department visits, beds, number of employees, and physicians. In January 2020, Sharp Chula Vista demonstrated its ongoing commitment to the community with the opening of a new seven-story patient tower, the first significant hospital construction in the South Bay in 40 years. The \$244.0 million Ocean View Tower addressed Sharp Chula Vista’s clinical requirements and capacity challenges by adding 197,000 square feet of new space. The Ocean View Tower comprises seven stories, 106 private rooms, a new surgery department, including the South Bay’s only hybrid operating room, a new kitchen, a panoramic roof-top café, and support space, as well as shelled space for expansion on the sixth floor. The project also included the construction of a new central plant, expansion of the emergency generator building, a 717-space parking garage, and a remodel of the first and second floors of the existing hospital to create linkages to the Ocean View Tower.

Programs and Services. Sharp Chula Vista offers a full complement of community hospital services. This includes a 24-hour emergency department, medical/surgical acute care, obstetrics, adult and neonatal intensive care, and surgery services. Major ancillary services include diagnostic imaging, laboratory, radiation oncology, pulmonary, endoscopy, physical rehabilitation, and infusion therapy. Listed below are descriptions of significant service lines and programs.

- *Cancer Treatment.* The opening of the Douglas & Nancy Barnhart Cancer Center (the “Barnhart Cancer Center”) in 2012 marked a major advancement in the hospital’s provision of state-of-the-art radiation therapy. The Barnhart Cancer Center offers advanced treatment technology, including intensity-modulated and image-guided radiation therapy, stereotactic radiosurgery, stereotactic body radiation therapy, and high dose rate brachytherapy. These

services complement a range of treatment options, including medical and surgical oncology, interventional oncology, infusion therapy, and many clinical trials. As part of the cancer centers at Sharp HealthCare, the cancer program at Sharp Chula Vista is the only one in the South Bay accredited by ACoSCoC as an Integrated Cancer Network Program.

- *Cardiovascular Care.* Sharp Chula Vista conducts a range of technologically advanced cardiovascular services including minimally invasive interventions for heart valve disease and other structures of the heart, endovascular treatment of peripheral vascular disease, electrophysiology, video-assisted thoracic surgery, vascular surgery, cardiac rehabilitation, and the South Bay's only open-heart surgery program. Sharp Chula Vista is a STEMI center and designated by The Joint Commission as a Primary Stroke Center, providing streamlined and optimized treatment for stroke and heart attack patients.
- *Robotic Surgery.* Similar to Sharp Memorial, Sharp Chula Vista's surgical facilities have robot-assisted surgical capabilities, providing physicians more precision, flexibility, and control for many types of complex and delicate procedures.
- *Sharp Mary Birch Center for Women & Newborns Chula Vista.* Sharp Chula Vista provides a range of maternity and gynecological care, including private labor and delivery suites, a nine-bed, Level II NICU, dedicated operating rooms, cord blood banking, breastfeeding classes, breastmilk donor program, and bilingual support groups.
- *Bloodless Medicine and Surgery.* Sharp Chula Vista introduced a bloodless medicine and surgery program in 2002 for patients who choose to avoid the use of blood or blood products. Sharp Chula Vista is the only hospital in the County to have specifically designated staff and a panel of physicians to support the unique needs and care of these patients.
- *Outpatient Services.* A full complement of outpatient programs and services are offered at Sharp Chula Vista, including surgical, cardiovascular, interventional radiology, endoscopy, laboratory, physical therapy, and imaging. A 24,000-square-foot, hospital-owned medical office building on the Sharp Chula Vista campus includes an outpatient imaging center and ambulatory surgery center. The imaging center, a joint venture between Sharp Chula Vista and radiology physicians, provides magnetic resonance imaging ("MRI"), CT, PET, ultrasound, mammography, general radiography and fluoroscopy, and bone densitometry services. Adjacent to the imaging center, the hospital's ambulatory surgery center provides outpatient surgical, endoscopic, and special procedures.

Sharp Grossmont

General. Sharp Grossmont was formed by the Corporation in 1991, and leases and operates a 562-bed acute care facility ("Grossmont Hospital") located in the East County region of the County, including the 90-bed Sharp Mary Birch Hospital for Women & Newborns Grossmont (the "Women's Hospital"), a 30-bed skilled nursing unit, a 46-bed behavioral health unit, and the 50-bed Sharp Grossmont Hospital for Neuroscience ("Neuroscience Hospital").

Hospital Lease. Grossmont Hospital is owned by Grossmont Hospital District (the "District"), which leases Grossmont Hospital to Sharp Grossmont pursuant to a long-term lease (the "Lease") that originally commenced on May 29, 1991, for a thirty-year term, and that was extended on July 1, 2014 for an additional thirty-year term, expiring on May 31, 2051.

Programs and Services. Sharp Grossmont provides a comprehensive range of primary, secondary, and specialized medical/surgical care and has the largest inpatient market share in the East County region of the County.¹ Services provided at Sharp Grossmont include emergency care, comprehensive neurosciences care, women’s services, psychiatry, cardiology, cancer treatment, advanced surgical and robotically-assisted minimally invasive procedures, physical rehabilitation services, hyperbaric oxygen therapy, behavioral health, multi-specialty ambulatory clinics, and a full spectrum of outpatient services. Sharp Grossmont operates one of the busiest emergency departments in the County, where each year approximately 120,000 people receive treatment in a care setting that has earned the prestigious Lantern Award, presented by the Emergency Nurses Association, an honor bestowed upon just 1% of the nation’s emergency departments for exceptional and innovative performance in leadership, practice, education, advocacy, and research. Sharp Grossmont also offers a variety of specialty services that include skilled nursing, home infusion, specialty pharmacy services, and hospice services, including multiple inpatient hospice facilities. Listed below are descriptions of selected major programs and services provided at Sharp Grossmont.

- *Neurosciences.* Reflecting its leadership in the region, Sharp Grossmont is accredited as a Comprehensive Stroke Center, the highest designation given by The Joint Commission in association with the AHA/American Stroke Association, with the availability to perform complex procedures including brain aneurysm clipping, mechanical thrombectomy, vascular malformation surgery, and carotid endarterectomy procedures used to repair and restore brain function after a stroke. Furthermore, Sharp Grossmont has a broad range of programs that enhance the neuroscience service line including movement disorder programs supported by the advanced technological capabilities of deep brain stimulation, advanced spine programs, neuro-oncology, and neurology follow-up care. The services are currently being expanded to include Magnetic Resonance Guided Focused Ultrasound Surgery, a first in the County, which will offer a minimally invasive approach to movement disorder treatment. Sharp Grossmont also provides stroke rehabilitation accredited by CARF. In 2025, Sharp Grossmont opened the Neuroscience Hospital, which transformed the hospital’s rehabilitation center into a single center of excellence featuring an inpatient progressive care unit, an inpatient rehabilitation unit, and a new 16-bed neurology intensive care unit (“ICU”), as well as comprehensive physical and occupational therapy areas. The design delivered a net addition of 20 patient beds to the hospital while simultaneously transforming the former rehabilitation unit into a fully functioning neuroscience center that can treat both inpatient and outpatient populations suffering from stroke or other brain and spinal conditions.
- *Cancer Treatment.* When Sharp Grossmont’s David and Donna Long Center for Cancer Treatment (the “Long Cancer Center”) opened in July 1993, it was the first comprehensive outpatient center for cancer screening, diagnosis, treatment, and educational resources in the County. The Long Cancer Center is accredited by ACoSCoC as a comprehensive cancer center, providing cancer surgery, inpatient care, radiation therapy, chemotherapy, and hematology; it also has a NAPBC designation.
- *Cardiac Care.* The cardiac program at Sharp Grossmont offers minimally invasive, noninvasive, and surgical procedures designed to treat a number of heart conditions. Services include open-heart surgery, cardiac catheterization, angioplasty, coronary stents, vascular surgery, electrophysiology lab, and cardiac rehabilitation, as well as mechanical assist devices for the support of the heart and lungs. Sharp Grossmont is established as a County-designated STEMI center, providing streamlined and optimized treatment for heart attack patients. Additionally Sharp Grossmont is one of the first facilities to have received certification under

the County of San Diego extracorporeal cardiopulmonary resuscitation (“ECPR”) Pilot Program, one of three facilities in the County to do so. This program designates Sharp Grossmont as a 24/7 ECPR capable receiving facility, with extracorporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO) available to treat incoming cardiac arrest patients. In 2018, Sharp Grossmont completed construction on the Burr Heart and Vascular Center comprising four cardiac catheterization labs, including a biplane room, as well as two hybrid operating rooms, an open-heart room, and one general surgery operating room.

- *Women’s Health.* The 90-bed Women’s Hospital specializes in women’s acute care, gynecology, obstetrics, and neonatology, and includes a 24-bed Level III NICU. Sharp Grossmont completed renovation of the Women’s Hospital in 2021 and added 18 additional licensed inpatient acute care beds as part of Sharp HealthCare’s strategy to expand and build additional women’s acute care programs, including women’s cardiac care, pelvic health, and a women’s health clinic. The Women’s Hospital also includes an 11-room pediatric unit that is managed, operated, and leased by Rady Children’s Hospital.
- *Outpatient Services.* A full complement of outpatient programs and services are offered at Sharp Grossmont, including surgical, cardiac, interventional radiology, vascular, endoscopy services, radiation oncology, outpatient infusion, laboratory services, physical therapy, wound care, limb preservation care, hyperbaric oxygen therapy, diabetes care, and sleep disorder care, as well as imaging services, including general diagnostic radiography, MRI, CT, PET, ultrasound, fluoroscopy, and nuclear medicine. To address the region’s emergent and urgent care demands, the campus also includes a multi-disciplinary care clinic with both appointment-based and immediate walk-in services, as well as the Burr Clinic focused on scheduled clinical services and hospital follow-up care. The appointment-based clinics allow patients, when necessary, to bridge to appropriate community-based primary care following a visit to the emergency department or an inpatient stay, thus reducing costly readmissions. The immediate walk-in services provide treatment to patients requiring urgent minor and low complexity services, allowing additional capacity for high-acuity volume growth in the emergency department. The emergency department includes the innovative Grossmont Psychiatric Assessment Treatment and Healing Unit, focused on emergent behavioral health treatment, which has the dual benefit of better addressing a patient’s medical and behavioral health as well as increasing capacity throughout the overall emergency department.
- *Hospice Services.* Sharp HospiceCare provides comprehensive end-of-life care and compassionate support for people with a life-limiting illness that have decided, with the support of their physician and family members, to forego further curative treatment in favor of comfort measures. Sharp HospiceCare is a licensed and Medicare-certified hospice agency serving the County as an operating division of Sharp Grossmont. In 2023, Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (“CAHPS”) named Sharp HospiceCare a Hospice CAHPS Honors Award recipient, the only hospice in the County to receive the honor, which recognizes agencies that continuously provide a positive patient experience and high-quality care as measured by the patient and caregiver experience. Sharp HospiceCare is also the only hospice program in California to offer three home-like, licensed hospice facilities staffed 24/7 with registered nurses, hospice aides, physicians, and support services for acute symptom management. A fourth hospice home located in the northern part of the County (“North County”) has been constructed and is awaiting licensing.

Sharp Coronado

General. Sharp Coronado (formerly known as The Coronado Hospital) became affiliated with the Corporation in July 1994. Sharp Coronado operates a 181-bed hospital consisting of 59 acute care beds and a 122-bed sub-acute and skilled nursing facility.

Hospital Lease. The hospital facilities are owned by the Coronado Hospital Foundation (“Coronado Foundation”) and the City of Coronado, which leases them to Sharp Coronado pursuant to a 30-year lease that originally commenced July 1, 1994 and now expires June 30, 2034. Beyond 2034, Sharp Coronado holds an option to extend the term of the lease for two additional periods of 10 years each.

Programs and Services. Services offered by Sharp Coronado include emergency care, general acute inpatient care, intensive care, ambulatory surgery, diagnostic imaging, physical and occupational therapy, sub-acute, and skilled nursing care to meet the needs of the populations of Coronado, Imperial Beach, and their surrounding communities where Sharp Coronado has the largest inpatient market share. Sharp Coronado operates one of the largest sub-acute units in the State, houses two centers of excellence, performs total joint replacement surgeries, and provides advanced hepatology care. Sharp Coronado is a member of the Planetree network and is one of just two hospitals in the world to maintain the Planetree Patient-Centered Hospital Designation consecutively since 2007. Furthermore, Sharp Coronado is one of only a few hospitals in the entire Planetree network to hold Planetree’s highest level of recognition – Designation with Distinction. The Joint Commission has awarded Sharp Coronado its Gold Seal of Approval and has certified the Hip and Knee Program consecutively since 2012. The Joint Commission also awarded Sharp Coronado Acute Stroke Ready Certification. In 2020, Sharp Coronado’s Emergency Department achieved the bronze level for the Geriatric Emergency Department Accreditations from the American College of Emergency Physicians. Furthermore, Sharp Coronado Emergency Department has received the certification for the MAT Bridge program which allows emergency department physicians to coordinate with social work and nursing to provide medication assisted treatment for patients struggling with opioid or alcohol addiction. Sharp Coronado is licensed to conduct and provide health care services by the CDPH Licensing and Certification Program, and is an eligible health care provider under Medicare, Medi-Cal, Blue Cross, and various commercial insurance programs.

Sharp Health Plan

Sharp Health Plan is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation formed by the Corporation in September 1992. Sharp Health Plan received its Knox-Keene license from the California Department of Corporations in September 1992. Such license, now under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Managed Health Care, along with a CMS license for Medicare Advantage products, enables Sharp Health Plan to offer managed care products through an HMO, Point of Service (“POS”), and Preferred Provider Organization (“PPO”). Sharp Health Plan enhances Sharp HealthCare’s ability to provide affordable and available health care coverage to its employees and the communities it serves. As of September 30, 2025, Sharp Health Plan had more than 166,000 commercial and Medicare enrollees. Sharp Health Plan provides services to its enrollees through a number of providers, including SRSMG, SCMG, and certain non-Sharp medical groups. Sharp Health Plan also contracts with Sharp Memorial, Sharp Mary Birch, Sharp Mesa Vista, Sharp McDonald Center, Sharp Chula Vista, Sharp Grossmont, and Sharp Coronado for inpatient and certain other institutional services, along with non-Sharp facilities including Tri-City Medical Center. Sharp Health Plan earned an overall rating of 4 out of 5 stars from Medicare for 2025 and is the highest member-rated Medicare Advantage Plan in California. In addition, Sharp Health Plan

is the highest rated commercial health plan in California for customer service, and among the highest rated plans for healthcare, specialist, and care coordination.

Continuous Quality Insurance

Continuous Quality Insurance is an offshore captive insurance company of the Corporation domiciled in Grand Cayman. It provides various professional and commercial general liability and stop-loss insurance services to the Corporation, as well as certain affiliated entities of the Corporation.

Sharp Surgery

Sharp Surgery is a California limited liability company established in 2021 to acquire the Corporation's majority interest in freestanding ASCs across the County. As of September 30, 2025, Sharp Surgery operates four freestanding ASCs.

Sharp Foundation

Sharp Foundation is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation formed in October 1979 and exists solely for the purpose of raising funds for Sharp HealthCare. The use of these funds is for capital expenditures, program support, and endowment. Unrestricted gifts are expended at the discretion of Sharp Foundation's Board of Directors (within guidelines established by the Corporation). Sharp Foundation also provides management and support services for Grossmont Foundation and Coronado Foundation (collectively, "the Foundations"), which provides funds for capital expenditures and program support for Sharp Grossmont and Sharp Coronado, respectively. The Sharp HealthCare philanthropy program incorporates both strategic and annual planning, including projections for both revenue and distributions for capital and operating initiatives across the system.

Grossmont Foundation

Grossmont Foundation is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation formed in 1985 and exists solely for the purpose of raising funds for Sharp Grossmont and Sharp HospiceCare. The use of these funds is for capital expenditures, program support, and endowment. Unrestricted gifts are expended at the discretion of Grossmont Foundation's Board of Governors. The foundation has been instrumental in bringing new services, infrastructure, technology, and programs to Sharp Grossmont and the community the hospital serves. Recent support includes investments in the Neuroscience Hospital, behavioral health center upgrades, Sharp HospiceCare support, including the fourth hospice home, and multiple technology investments that provide state-of-the-art care for the patients and practitioners at Sharp Grossmont.

Accreditations, Licenses, and Memberships

All Sharp HealthCare acute hospitals are fully accredited by The Joint Commission and are in compliance with the applicable CMS requirements and California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") licensing requirements. In addition, the Orthopedic and Stroke programs have the Disease Specific Care Certification by The Joint Commission. The Oncology services at Sharp Memorial, Sharp Chula Vista, and Sharp Grossmont are recognized as an Integrated Network Cancer Program by the ACoSCoC. All Sharp HealthCare hospitals maintain memberships in the Hospital Association of San Diego & Imperial Counties, the California Hospital Association, and the American Hospital Association.

Sharp Memorial, Sharp Mary Birch, Sharp Mesa Vista, Sharp McDonald Center, Sharp Chula Vista, Sharp Grossmont, and Sharp Coronado are each licensed to conduct and provide health care services by the CDPH Licensing and Certification Program and have each been approved as eligible health care providers by Medicare, Medi-Cal, Blue Cross, and numerous commercial insurance programs. Sharp McDonald Center does not accept Medicare or Medi-Cal.



GEOGRAPHIC SERVICE AREAS – SAN DIEGO COUNTY



Exhibit C

Description of Transaction

For a description of Tri-City Healthcare District (the “District”) and Tri-City Medical Center (the “Hospital”), please see the response to Question 3 in the District’s submission. For a description of Sharp, please see the summary provided in Exhibit A.

As a result of an extended period of financial difficulty (see Attachment B-1 attached hereto) the District engaged Juniper Advisory to oversee a lengthy process of identifying and selecting a potential partner. After a careful and deliberative evaluation, the District selected Sharp HealthCare as its preferred potential partner and negotiated a Term Sheet executed by the District and Sharp HealthCare in June 2025.

In accordance with the Term Sheet, Sharp HealthCare and its wholly-controlled subsidiary Tri-City Medical Center Corporation (“STCMC”; collectively, with Sharp HealthCare “Sharp”) entered into an Affiliation Agreement the District in December, 2025 pursuant to which, after receipt of regulatory approvals and the satisfaction of other transaction closing (“Closing”) conditions:

- the District and STCMC would enter into 30-year leases (the “Leases”) pursuant to which the District would lease the real property and fixtures used in the operation of the Hospital and certain of its related properties to STCMC. This is a common and well-established transaction structure used by California healthcare districts in accordance with all statutory and regulatory requirements.
- the District and STCMC would enter into a Transfer Agreement (the “Transfer Agreement”) pursuant to which STCMC would assume substantially all of the District’s Hospital and ancillary-business-related assets (including personal property, equipment, contracts, minority interests in certain joint ventures, etc.) and commit to use the assumed assets for the continued operation of the Hospital’s business and the benefit of the communities served by the District.
- pursuant to the Affiliation Agreement, Lease and Transfer Agreement (collectively, the “Definitive Agreements”) STCMC would also assume the District’s debt and liabilities (approximately \$225.5 million as of the District’s 6/30/2025 audited financials), and make financial commitments over time toward service line development, growth, infrastructure, deferred maintenance, and capital projects including:
 - \$50 million over 5 years for general maintenance/capital expenditures (including IT, cybersecurity, and systems);
 - \$50 million over 5 years for strategic investments in North County (including support of the development and growth of North San Diego County-related ambulatory or clinical facilities and services, physician recruitment, retention and alignment);
 - costs associated with implementation of Epic EHR in addition to and other IT expansion (an anticipated total of ~\$66 million);
 - costs associated with seismic compliance (anticipated to be approximately \$138 million); and
 - commitments for the parties to seek general obligation bond financing post-Closing.
- pursuant to the Affiliation Agreement, the District will have post-Closing representation in STCMC’s and Sharp HealthCare’s governance;

- pursuant to the Affiliation Agreement, STCMC will offer employment to eligible District employees and preserve the District’s collective bargaining agreements; and
- the Definitive Agreement includes a methodology to address valuation and return of assets to the District upon termination of the Definitive Agreement, per statutory requirements.

The proposed and above-described affiliation transaction between Sharp and the District (the “Proposed Transaction”) is expected, as a result of the Hospital’s anticipated improved post-Closing financial position and access to Sharp services, to enhance North County’s access to high-quality clinical care, improve patient experience at the Hospital, and help ensure financial stability for both organizations. In particular, the Proposed Transaction is expected to:

- expand access to primary and specialty care in North County communities;
- meet community needs by providing best-in-class care close to home;
- support investment in next-generation technologies and innovations;
- enhance quality and health outcomes;
- restore specialty services such as labor and delivery;
- modernize the Hospital’s electronic health record and business systems;
- enable seismic upgrades at the Hospital;
- reduce costs through economies of scale;
- ensure long-term financial sustainability for both the Hospital and Sharp;
- enhance competition in North County by improving and expanding the capabilities of its current market participants and expanding Sharp’s ability to provide services in the communities served by the District; and
- avoid the significant potential risk of the loss of healthcare services and jobs in the communities served by the District and the Hospital.


Given the financial importance of the Proposed Transaction for the parties and the Hospital, and the detailed public approval process for District hospital transactions, which is expected to conclude with voter approval on June 2, 2026, the District and Sharp respectfully request that OHCA identify whether it will issue a waiver for the transaction in advance of March 6, 2026.

The parties hope that OHCA finds comfort as it conducts its review in the fact that this District transaction will be, separate from any OHCA review process, and as required by California Health & Safety Code § 32000 et seq., has been subject to multiple public meetings (including public meetings already held on October 30, November 6, November 7, November 12, November 13, and December 11, in all three District communities (Oceanside, Vista, and Carlsbad)) through which community comment and input on the Proposed Transaction has been received. Furthermore, the transaction will be subject to voter approval in June 2026, which provides another layer of public review and scrutiny. In addition, OHCA should note that the California Attorney General will be notified (post-Closing) of the Proposed Transaction, and therefore the transaction will be subject to the direct oversight and jurisdiction of the Attorney General.

Exhibit D – Pre and Post Transaction Services

(A) Sharp currently furnishes services within San Diego and Riverside Counties. Tri-City Healthcare District currently furnishes services within San Diego County and facilitates access to necessary health care services to the community members within the District. As required by applicable law and described in the Affiliation Agreement, Sharp will continue to operate and maintain all of the District's health care facilities and its assets for the benefit of the communities served by District. Other than the foregoing, the parties do not anticipate any other post-transaction changes to the counties where Sharp performs services.

(B) Sharp is a nonprofit integrated regional health system serving San Diego and Riverside Counties, consisting of four acute-care hospitals, five specialty hospitals, three affiliated medical groups, a licensed health plan, and a full spectrum of inpatient, outpatient, ambulatory, and post-acute services (as described in Exhibit A). Tri-City Medical Center (the "Hospital") is a separately licensed general acute care hospital with a 40-bed basic emergency department, and related inpatient and outpatient service lines. The transaction is structured to protect and facilitate the hospital's continued delivery of certain core services (including, without limitation, basic cardiac and neurological services), while also establishing a better financial posture through which other services may be continued and/or expanded. The parties anticipate that the transaction will result in necessary and substantial operating and financial investment for the Hospital to achieve seismic compliance to maintain operations as a general acute care hospital and to maintain basic emergency services. Further, the parties anticipate that the transaction will allow the Hospital to expand and re-open key service lines, including labor & delivery and neonatal intensive care unit services, which were closed due to the Hospital's financial limitations in 2023. Other than the foregoing, the parties do not anticipate any other post-transaction changes to the scope and levels of health care services currently offered by Sharp.

(C) See Attachment D-1 for the patient data breakdown, separated into Inpatient and Outpatient categories, which may overlap. Please note that due to technical limitations affecting the data export, the aggregated outpatient data provided here captures patient "registrations", which is a significantly lower number than patient "encounters" (for example, a patient with twelve outpatient encounters in a month, such as for rehab or chemo, etc., would only count as a single "registration").

(D) The 2025 Hospital Association of San Diego & Imperial Counties Community Health Needs Assessment identified priority health and social needs across San Diego County, including chronic health conditions, behavioral health challenges, and socioeconomic factors (such as housing instability, economic stress, limited access to timely care, and constrained support systems) that disproportionately impact vulnerable populations. Sharp's Community Benefit Program includes medical care services, other benefits for vulnerable populations, other benefits for the broader community, health research, education, and training programs. In its fiscal year ended September 30, 2024, Sharp provided \$622.6 million in community benefit programs and services that were unreimbursed. Post-transaction, Tri-City Medical Center will be included in Sharp's community needs assessments, charity care program, and community benefit programs.

(E) Sharp facilities currently accept both Medicare and Medi-Cal patients. The parties do not anticipate any post-transaction changes.
