SLRP Pharmacists (PharmD) Guidelines

To be eligible for SLRP, a licensed pharmacist must be employed or have accepted employment at a SLRP approved outpatient or ambulatory Practice Site. Additionally, licensed pharmacists must provide direct patient care, which includes **only** the following responsibilities:

- Provides consultation, training, and education to patients about drug therapy, disease management, and disease prevention.
- Provides professional information, including clinical or pharmacological information, advice, or consultation to other health care professionals.
- Participates in multidisciplinary review of patient progress, including appropriate access to medical records.
- Participates in the evaluation and management of diseases and health conditions in collaboration with other health care providers.
- Administers immunizations.
- Performs patient assessments.
- Furnishes and prescribes medications.
- Orders and interprets tests for the purpose of monitoring and managing the efficacy and toxicity of drug therapies.

Direct patient care can be administered via several modalities including face-to-face interaction as well as telehealth.

Please note: Pharmacists whose primary roles are dispensing medication and/or are located in retail settings <u>are not eligible</u> for SLRP.

Additionally, your practice site must be willing to match the SLRP award, on a dollar-for-dollar basis with non-federal contributions (directly or through donations from public or private entities). For example, if SLRP awards you \$25,000, your practice site must be willing to match the award amount.
