Application Evaluation Criteria

- During the application process, Song Brown uses a two-part methodology to evaluate four criteria:
 - I.1 Percent and number of graduates in medically underserved areas.
 - I.2 Percent and number of graduates underrepresented in medicine.
 - I.3 Percent and number of clinical training sites in medically underserved areas.
 - II.1 Percent and number of students underrepresented in medicine.

Section I: Scoring Methodology

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section I Scoring Methodology Part 1: Percentage

- Scoring Methodology Part 1: Predetermined point system.
 - The range of percentages the program falls within determines points for percentage.

Sections I.1, I.2, and I.3

Percentage	Points
<1%	0
1-16 %	2
17-33%	4
34-50.99%	6
51-67.99%	8
68-84.99%	10
85-100%	12

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section I Scoring Methodology Part 1: Example

Program X Example

- The program has 58 percent graduates underrepresented in medicine.
- The percentage methodology shows that the program will receive 8 points.

Sections I.1, I.2, and I.3

Percentage	Points
<1%	0
1-16 %	2
17-33%	4
34-50.99%	6
51-67.99%	8
68-84.99%	10
85-100%	12

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section I Scoring Methodology Part 2: Number


- Graduate Scoring Methodology Part 2: Placement in a normal distribution.
 - The program's placement in a normal distribution determines the points.

Sections I.1, I.2, and I.3

Number	Points
<= μ-3σ	1
> μ-3σ and <= μ-2σ	2
> μ-2σ and <= μ-σ	3
> μ-σ and <= μ	4
> μ and <= μ+σ	5
> μ+σ and <= μ+2σ	6
> μ+2σ and <= μ+3σ	7
> μ+3σ	8

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section I Scoring Methodology Part 2: Example


- Program X Example
 - Program X has 15 graduates underrepresented in medicine.
 - According to the curve, the program will receive five points.



Application Evaluation Criteria: Section I Scoring Methodology Total Score

- Scoring Methodology Total Score: Combined scores of Part 1 and Part 2.
 - After Part 1 and Part 2 are determined, the score is combined for the applicant's total score.
 - For example, Program X received 8 points for Part 1 and 5 points for Part 2, the program will receive a score of 13 points.

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section II Scoring Methodology Part 1: Percentage

- Scoring Methodology Part 1: Predetermined point system.
 - The range of percentages the program falls within determines points for percentage.

Section II.1 Student Scoring

Number	Points
0-33.9%	0
34-50.99%	2
51-67.99%	5
68-100%	8

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section II Scoring Methodology Part 1: Example

Program X Example

- The program has 40 percent students underrepresented in medicine.
- The percentage methodology shows that the program will receive 2 points.

Section II.1 Student Scoring

	Number	Points
	0-33.9%	0
/	34-50.99%	2
	51-67.99%	5
	68-100%	8

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section II Scoring Methodology Part 2: Number

- Student Scoring Methodology Part 2: URM number
 - The number of students underrepresented in medicine will be scored in the following rubric.

Section II.1

Number	Points
0-28	0
29-42	1
43-56	4
57 or more	7

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section II Scoring Methodology Part 2: Example

Program X Example

- Program X has 52 students underrepresented in medicine.
- The number methodology shows that the program will receive 4 points.

29-42	1
43-56	4
57 or more	7

Application Evaluation Criteria: Section II Scoring Methodology Total Score

- Scoring Methodology Total Score: Combined scores of Part 1 and Part 2.
 - After Part 1 and Part 2 are determined, the score is combined for the applicant's total score.
 - For example, Program X received 2 points for Part 1 and 4 points for Part 2, the program will receive a score of 6 points.
